

Price Support Programs For Grain Crops Given

Price support programs for 1948 crop wheat, oats, barley, and rye have recently been announced by the U. S. department of agriculture. Loans will be the method used to support prices for all these grains. Loans will be made to farmers on the farm-stored and warehouse-stored wheat, oats, barley, and rye from the time of harvest through December 31, 1948. All loans will carry interest at the rate of 3 per cent per annum and will mature on April 30, 1949, or earlier upon demand.

The following schedule was given:

Wheat — Interim terminal loan rates on 1948 wheat amounting to 17 cents a bushel higher than the final terminal loan rates for 1947 crop wheat have been announced. This year's higher rates reflect 90 per cent of the increase in wheat parity prices since July 1, 1947, plus increased freight and handling charges, less a 2-cents-a-bushel margin.

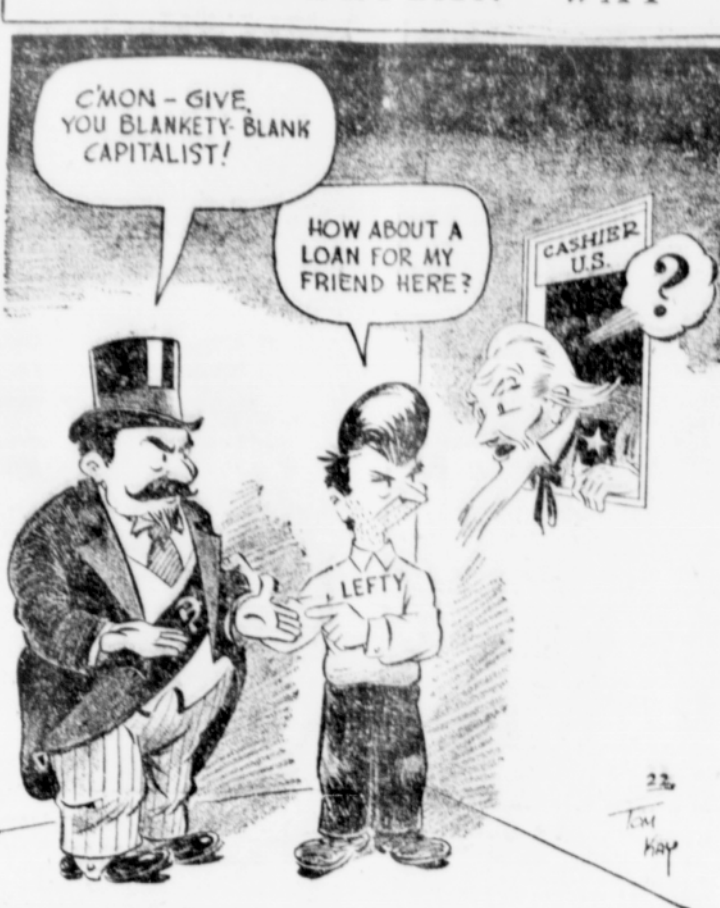

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Protection for Farmers Urged At Grange Meet

ASTORIA — In carrying out a "sound national policy" of abundant agricultural production, the farmers of America must have assurance that they will be protected when unavoidable surpluses which will often result from such a policy threaten their financial well-being, asserted Morton Tompkins, Master of the Oregon State Grange, in opening the 75th annual convention of the organization here today.

Tompkins asserted that "any long-range farm program that does not provide this protection against surpluses is not worthy of the name." He went on to say that the various "unworkable" parity proposals which have been tried during the past several years and urged that the delegates again go on record for enactment of legislation providing for stop-loss prices for the farmer and a farm program that applies to all farm commodities.

On the subject of conservation of natural resources, Tompkins chided farmers for neglecting the soil of precious minerals and allowing what is left to be blown away down into our streams, while "crying to the heavens about the despoilation of our forests and the exhausting of our oil and mineral wealth."

"I have said it before and I say it again—we must adopt, while heartedly a new concept of ownership of natural resources," Tompkins asserted. "Resource ownership does not give us the right to want only to destroy that resource. We are but stewards of that resource and must guard it carefully for coming generations. By one means or another, every farmer should be made financially able to carry out desirable soil conservation practices. When that is done, the program should be made compulsory."

To alleviate flood dangers and to provide added power and irrigation facilities, Tompkins urged speedy construction of McNary, Hungry Horse, Foster Creek and Hells Canyon dams on the Columbia and its upper tributaries and the completion of the Willamette Flood control project.

Among other recommendations made by Tompkins in his annual message, he urged that study be given to the abolition of the office of chancellor in the state system of higher education, making the presidents of the various institutions "presidents in fact as well as in name," responsible directly to the State Board of Higher Education.

The session will continue on until some time Friday evening. Incidentally, in deference to the traditional opposition of farmers to daylight saving time, the convention program is scheduled for standard time despite the fact that the host city now operates on the former.
