

Washington County Health Group Gets 25-Year Citation

Mrs. Zola Morgan, executive secretary, in her report to the Washington County TB and Health Association board in her office Thursday night, told about the association receiving a citation "for 25 years of service to the public." Mrs. Gordon Addington received it in the name of the Association. Mrs. Morgan also reported that at request of the State TB office she gave two 5-minute talks or reports at the annual meeting. One was on the "Social Hygiene program in Washington County" and the other was "What is Good Public Hygiene."

Two of the newly elected board members were present and introduced Dr. C. E. Mason, Beaverton, first vice-president, and Mrs. George Laver, Banks, second vice-president, 13 being in attendance. Mrs. Laver and Mrs. Addington of the McKinley Community club reported on the Oregon TB and Health Association annual meeting held in Portland May 12 and 13 at the Multnomah hotel.

Mrs. Laver reported about how during our last war one of the doctors in a concentration camp through an underground movement was able to carry on a tuberculosis testing and BCG vaccination plan and give to all the inmates in the camp without knowledge to the Germans. B. C. G. name for the TB vaccination was for three French doctors who found the vaccine in 1906.

She also reported on tuberculosis survey among the Alaska Indians where in a school room of 30 children all but six died of tuberculosis. This was quite prevalent throughout Alaska among the Indians. She reported that it was

found that there was a great deal of tuberculosis in our mental and penal institutions. Mrs. Addington reported on the Social Hygiene meetings. She said that tuberculosis was involuntary infection while VD was voluntary infection or "conduct determined diseases." Mrs. Addington brought out that it was necessary to budget for the program, set up a committee on Social Hygiene, select a single phase and understand it, then go on to the next step. She said the committee should be made up of people from the juvenile office, medical society, law enforcement office as well as others throughout the county.

Miss Corinne Pennington, supervising nurse, and Miss Elizabeth Panck, RN from the county health department, told the board about TB case findings in this county. This was the last board meeting until September.

Truman in Portland Friday.—President Truman will drive for 45 minutes through the streets of Portland Friday. His tour will start from the SW Market street side of the Auditorium at 1:45 p. m. and at 2:30 p. m. he is to reach his special train in the Brooklyn railroad yards.

Soggy Dikes Cause Concern.—The condition of soggy dikes between Troutdale and the sea gave increasing cause for concern Wednesday following the second important break in 12 hours late Tuesday in the lower Columbia river. Floodwaters poured over most of Puget island after 10 p. m. when a 50-foot gap was torn through a dike on the east end between Westport and Cathlamet, Wash.
