

Stuart Appointed Vets' Rights Aid

Dolph G. Stuart of Hillsboro, county veterans' service officer for Washington county, has been named a volunteer veterans' reemployment rights committee aid in obtaining reemployment and service rights to which they are entitled under the Selective Service Act. Art Chamberlain, field representative of the veterans' reemployment rights division of the U. S. department of labor, announced Stuart's appointment here today.

Cooperative arrangements have been made whereby the veterans' reemployment rights division, the Oregon state division of veterans' affairs, the state employment service and the county service officers have pooled their services to handle veterans' reemployment rights cases.

Stuart will provide advice and assistance to veterans who feel that they have not received reemployment and service rights to which they are entitled under the Selective Service Act. The reemployment rights function of the Selective Service act were transferred to the U. S. department of labor when the Selective Service act expired last March 31.

"Every effort will be made to adjust all cases amicably," Stuart said. "This is in keeping with the policy declared by Secretary of Labor Schwelblich and Robert K. Salyers, director of the department's veterans' reemployment rights division. Litigation will be resorted to only when there appears to be a violation of the veteran's rights, which cannot be resolved otherwise. We believe, however, that such cases will be rare."

peg's corner

Ma Nature has turned on some summer weather. That beautiful rose garden in back of the court house is beginning to bloom. The court house lawn smells like summer when they mow it, and the trees all have on summer green of all shades. All of which means that June is really "bustle" out all over and spring is all through and we can get on with our summer activities. That brings up the subject of how to spend less time in the kitchen and more time with the children who are left high and dry without school to occupy their minds for the next few weeks.

By way of spending less time in the kitchen . . . Serve a light dessert that can be made the day before and stored in the refrigerator.

Butterscotch Tapioca
3 cups milk
4 tablespoons quick cooking tapioca

1/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg separated
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Combine milk, tapioca and salt in top of double boiler. Cook over boiling water for five minutes after mixture is sealed, stirring constantly. Add a little of the hot mixture to the beaten egg yolk, then pour into tapioca mixture and cook three minutes longer, still stirring constantly. Add brown sugar and vanilla and stir until sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat and fold in stiffly beaten egg white. Serve chilled. (Serves 6.)

And here is a clever way to serve potatoes and meat. Bake potatoes until soft when squeezed. Cut open lengthwise and scoop out insides without breaking skins. Place insides of potatoes in bowl with salt and pepper and enough milk to moisten and beat fluffy. Now add 1/2 to 1 lb. fried hamburger broken into small pieces. Pile back into shells, sprinkle with paprika, place a pat of butter or cheese on top heat under broiler until cheese or butter is melted.

This recipe was printed in the other Argus cookbook, but it sounded so good I couldn't resist printing it here. It came from Mrs. J. D. Johnson, route 3, Hillsboro. Thank you, Mrs. Johnson.

Physical Exams Due Here Soon

All children who will enter school for the first time in September should have physical examinations and complete immunizations immediately. The local health department said this applies to children who are to enter either kindergarten or the first grade.

Dr. Hollister M. Stoltz, medical director of the county health department, urges those who have not done so already to attend to this important procedure early in the summer. It is necessary that an early start be made so that all children can comply with the school health requirements by having their examinations completed before the opening of school. Many parents have responded to earlier notices.

The health examination may be made by the family physician in his office and the completed report sent to the health department for recording in whatever district the child will enter school. All physicians in the county have uniform blanks for recording pertinent findings.

It is the parents' responsibility to see that the completed health examination blank is filed in the health department office before the opening of school. If anyone wishes to come to the health department in the court house for this service, they should call Hillsboro 3461 for an appointment.

Community Chest Helps Homeless

Voluntary child caring agencies of the Oregon Chest in cooperation with the state public welfare department and the Red Cross have arranged to care for all children homeless as a result of the Columbia and Vanport floods.

All the services and facilities of the Oregon Chest agencies were immediately placed at the disposal of the Red Cross and public welfare authorities and staff members have been working around the clock on disaster relief, according to L. A. Warner, Salem, state president.

No estimate was immediately available as to the number of children who would be left homeless or dependent as a result of the flood which extended practically across the entire state of Oregon. Welfare authorities agreed that the major impact would be increasingly felt in the future when homeless children are located and family readjustments are worked out.

The child caring agencies will continue to render emergency service as long as is needed through the plan of cooperation with the state welfare department and the Red Cross and then will turn to the problems of more or less permanent services required as a result of the flood. This continuing service to those in need is made possible in part by the funds contributed by the people of each county in Oregon to their Community Chests last fall.

Driving Violations Bring High Fines

The Hillsboro city police collected \$1595.50 in fines during April and May, according to Chief Melvin E. DeRock. Of the total, \$1012.50 came from 149 arrests for violating driving laws of the road. Parking citations brought in \$237.

The police issued 896 parking citations during the two months, DeRock said, and 79 warnings for parking violations. Nine arrests for intoxication last month brought \$125 in fines and one arrest in April for driving while drunk brought a \$100 fine.

Three minors were arrested for possession of liquor, 12 dogs were impounded, six accidents and 43 complaints were investigated and 19 arrests were made for bicycle offenses during the period. Sixty-eight auto accidents were reported and four special traffic cases handled.

Of 15 burglaries reported, three were cleared up. The police investigated 18 cases of larceny.

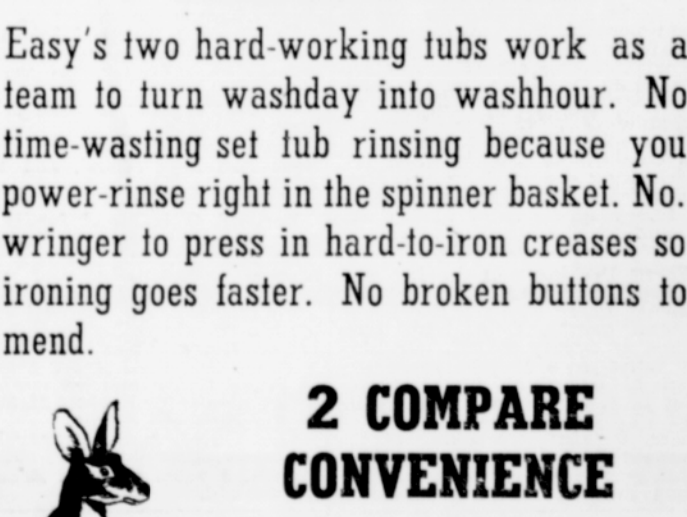

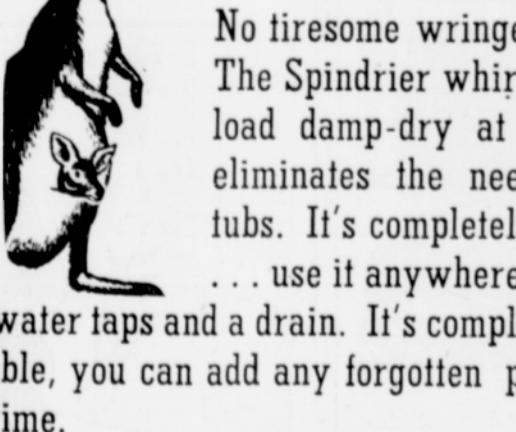

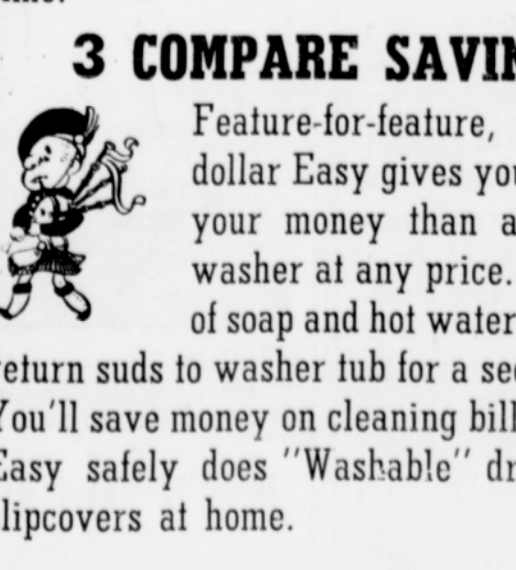
