Ban on Set Net Fishing Sought

Several initiative petitions to ban all fishing with fixed gear on the Columbia river are being circulated throughout the county by business and professional people and sportsmen. The petitions, initiated by Henry Niemela, Astoria, and Charles F. Henne, Tidewater, propose a measure to be voted on at the November election making it unlawful to construct or maintain any pound net, fish trap, fish wheel, scow fish wheel, set net, weir, drag seine, whip seine or other fixed appliances in the Columbia river or its tributaries for the catching of salmon, salmon trout or steelhead. Fishing with fixed gear has been banned in the state of Washington since 1904. Sponsors of the petitions are: Fred M. Washington, who has threatened to make fixed gear lawful again unless Oregon bans the appliances. The petitions will remain in circulation until about June 25. The petitions must be filed with the secretary of state by July 1.
