Confidentially, I think it is smart to make your own clothes! I used to do it when I was in school out of necessity, six bits a week doesn't buy very much in the line of clothes, but now it has become something of a matter of pride to see just how chic I can be for as little money as possible. A couple of years ago it was rather discouraging to try to do much, but now that fashion has given a big lurch patterned so radically that a person feels like three years ago without a longer and fuller skirt... and since materials are much more plentifully not cut it is a cinch to build nearly all your own things.

Simply, Advance, New York and McCall patterns are carried right here in Hillsboro. There is a monthly Vogue pattern magazine carried at the drug stores that is excellent. It has the pattern numbers and many extra hints and instructions that are foolproof to both beginner and the seasoned sewer.

For beginners, Vogue patterns are a little more in a little more in money and will save your disposition and time in the long run. The directions do everything but sew the material together for you. They leave nothing to the imagination. Pick out the first few with an eye to simple, distinctive lines, and good materials and go to it. Don't worry if the first few things you make don't look quite like you thought they would. Good sewers are made not born. It comes with experience. This time of year is good to start to sew cause you can always tear it up if it's no good and make aprons out of it. The first year or two that I sewed I just about supplied the whole neighborhood with aprons. McCall patterns are very complete, too. They have the cut-away borders, too, that is you cut away about an inch of pattern as you follow a line marking the cutting edge. Some like this and others don't. Try a couple before you decide for or against them. Simplicity has this feature also as of about a year or so ago. Simplicity leaves some of the directions to the imagination but the styles are cute, so if you go slowly and be careful, it's definitely worth it. Advance, Hollywood, New York are very up to the minute. Watch the fit. Be sure to measure the pieces to check whether they match your measurements before you cut them out. After you sew a few things for yourself you will find out just which patterns fit your figure the best they are all good. The catch is to know just which ones need altering.

If you are going to sew for only yourself, maybe there is a kind-hearted soul in the neighborhood who will allow you to use her machine at first... but if there are any children in your family... a sewing machine should have top priority. The newer machines will save you dollars and dollars by the one feature that they will go backwards and forwards with just a flick of the switch. It is amazing how many rips and tears in the children's clothes, in the household linen, and in your and your husband's clothes can be fixed in just a few minutes. After you get the

Grove Election Hits New Snag

A faulty school consolidation election will delay start of construction of Forest Grove's new elementary plant until the middle of August, the earliest possible date, it was announced last week.

John Shuler, bonding attorney, has ruled that certain legal technicalities are defective in the consolidation of Watts No. 27 and half of Purdin district No. 5 with Forest Grove district No. 15. Failure to give adequate descriptions of consolidated territory and to publish notices a full two weeks ahead of the election were among the points cited.

Several possibilities exist for correction but the speediest seems to be to back up and start over. This means holding new consolidation elections and resubmitting to voters the recently voted \$250,000 bond issue for the new plant. The bonds any quarters.

GI Unemployment Policy Explained

Readjustment allowances under the GI Bill of Rights will be available to veterans during summer vacation only after their school subsistence allowances have expired and they are actively in the labor market for suitable jobs.

This warning was issued today by Silas Gaiser, administrator for the Oregon Unemployment Compensation commission, which through its 32 local offices accepts claims and administers the readjustment allowance program under arrangement with the veterans' administration.

Many of the 13,500 veterans now attending Oregon colleges and 10,000 others in schools and on-the-job training are expected to accept

will have to be re-advised and sold again.

Although a test of legality of the consolidation could be carried to the state supreme court, with past cases indicating the merger would be upheld, it is not certain this would meet the approval of the bonding attorney, whose favorable opinion is required by bond buyers.

seasonal jobs in food processing, harvest, construction and lumbering. Between two and three thousand will leave schools to enter the labor market permanently.

"We are anxious to have all former service men and women understand that their educational allowances, which often extend two weeks beyond the school year, must have ended before they become eligible for unemployment benefits," Gaiser said.

"When claims are taken in our local offices, all earnings or allowances for the weekly period must be reported by veterans or other workers. These claimants—whether under the federal or state program—not only must be able and available for job opportunities that are offered in their communities, but they must be actively seeking work. This was added to the state's unemployment law by the 1947 legislation."

Currently about 5000 Oregon veterans are being paid readjustment allowances because they are unable to find suitable jobs.



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
