Selection of Goddess Set Saturday Night

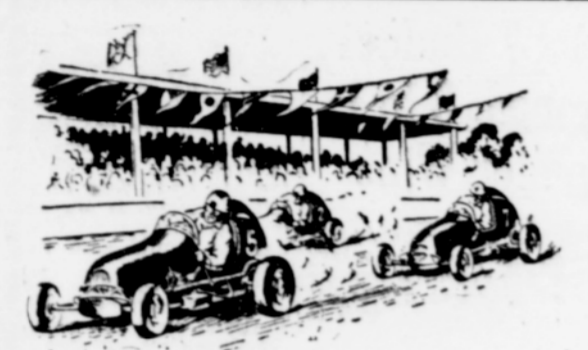
(Continued from Page 1) entertained by the Washington County Automobile Dealers association at a dinner at Forest Hills Country club.

(Continued from Page 1) Heved to be interested in the measure than in any other single issue ever brought before the city.

According to two polls conducted earlier this year, one by the recreation commission and the other by the Argus, public opinion was overwhelmingly in favor of a supervised recreation program.

In a random public opinion survey conducted by the Argus six weeks later, not one person out of 13 polled even suggested that the recreation program should be rejected.

Whether the measure was rejected because the people of Hillsboro want no recreation program for children or because they felt they couldn't afford to pay \$9300 to get the program off on the right foot is not known.

The commission, appointed by the council seven months ago to formulate a recreation program, appealed several times for expressions of public opinion on the program. But the public, except for proponents of supervised recreation, stayed in the background until Friday's election.

What the city council will do now about the recreational problem is not known. Council members probably feel that the people have spoken against recreation and so the next move is up to the people.

At least one group appeared undaunted by the reversal suffered. A local Lions club committee is working to see if the community can't organize at least a summer recreation program.

Following a directors' meeting, President Lloyd Ramp announced that the following committee had been named to work with other individuals and groups interested in the project: Harold Wynne, chairman, and Ed Brown, Larry Sisson and Louis Lomax.

(Continued from page 1) going law, the doubt as to the power of the city so to do must be resolved against the city, and in order for Hillsboro to cooperate in the construction of this swimming pool with school district No. 7, there will have to be some express charter or legislative authority granted to the city so to do.

He said he felt that a charter amendment or a state law granting to cities the right to construct swimming tanks or other public recreational facilities on school grounds would be legal if adopted.

School boards, Patterson continued, have the right to construct swimming pools upon their school properties and to permit the public to use the pool and demand a charge for its use providing the public's use does not interfere with the use of the pool by the school.

However, the land at the Barnes school adjacent to the gymnasium could not be sold to the city for construction of a pool because the land "would be carved out of the existing school premises and would be physically connected to the school premises and immediately thereafter would be used by the school for school purposes."

This land could be sold to the city if the voters of the school district authorize it at an election, he said. He points out that the school district would have no right to levy a tax for the purpose of furnishing heat and shower facilities to the swimming tank to be used for community recreation.
