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News Highlights Of the Week

Dewey Gets Support
Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York broke through the "lawyer son" barrier at the Republican convention Tuesday night and claimed a commanding lead in the race for the GOP presidential nomination.

Ex-President Herbert Hoover told the convention that the world crisis is deeper than some may think and it is up to the Republican party to lead the way out. He urged a strong U. S. to thwart Soviet advances.

Senator Arthur Vandenberg gave consent Wednesday for his name to be placed formally in nomination for the presidency at the Republican convention.

Congress Adjourns
The 80th congress adjourned soon after dawn Sunday in a burst of speed which completed a legislative record that will provide major issues in the coming presidential campaign. In the final 24 hours congress approved and sent to the White House the draft, foreign aid appropriation, farm, displacement, federal and postal pay raise and atomic energy commission bills.

2000 Facing Draft
The new peacetime selective service will call about 2000 Oregon men to military duty in the first year of its operation, Col. Francis W. Mason, assistant adjutant general, said Tuesday.

Union Press Ruled Free
The supreme court Monday ruled the Taft-Hartley act does not forbid political partisanship in newspapers. It is out of labor union funds. Unanimously the court added that if the law did do that the constitutionality of the law would be highly questionable.

Coal Talks On Again
Soft coal contract talks began once more Tuesday night, just eight days before the present work agreements ends. The new talks followed by a few hours a sweeping court victory for Lewis Federal Judge Goldsborough had just upheld the \$100 monthly pension plan that Lewis wants for aged members of his United Mine Workers.

Stop Berlin Trains
U. S. army Sunday stopped sending supplies into Berlin by rail for the American population. The action was taken rather than submit the trains to Soviet inspection.

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Contract Let for Music Building

A contract for construction of a new music building for Hillsboro high school was let last week to the Milbrandt Construction company of Portland. The company submitted a low basic bid of \$44,450 for the work, but the figure was reduced to \$41,700 by an alteration of plans.

The building is to provide separate rooms for vocational and instrumental departments, separate practice rooms, musical director's room, plumbing and heating facilities, dressing rooms and ample storage rooms for instruments and uniforms. It was planned to be into the over-all expansion program now being developed to take care of the heavy increase in enrollment.

The building, to extend from the old agricultural building, will be of reinforced concrete with stucco exterior, designed to harmonize with the architecture of the present high school building.

Other bidders received were: Home Construction Co. of Beaverton, \$48,244, or a minimum figure of \$41,886 if all alternates were applied against the basic, and Robertson, Hay & Wallace of Portland, \$55,995, or a minimum bid of \$48,000.
