Draft-Age Men Boost Enlistment
Thirty-three men were enlisted Friday to set a new high in army and air force recruiting in Portland. Capt. Kenneth Swenson, commanding officer of the Portland recruiting office, announced Monday. It was the largest number of men processed in any single day in the Portland office since January 1, 1947.
The captain said 27 of the group were young men of draft age, who wanted to get a jump on the draft by volunteering before selective service goes into effect.
Men who volunteer have their choice of branch of service, and technical training schools in the case of high school graduates. Capt. Swenson pointed out and many of those enlisting now will reach non-commissioned grades by the time the big rush comes.
Three of the 33 sworn in were veterans, and three men were over

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
