**Auto Accidents Increasing Here**

Motorists are banging into each other on county roads with increasing regularity, according to records at the sheriff's office. A total of 60 accidents, which occurred in the county and outside of towns, were reported last week.

This was the highest week of accidents since the first week of May in 1946 when 70 were reported. Whereas 22 people were reported injured at that time, only 10 peo-

ple were listed as hurt last week, none fatally. A large number of the accidents are happening on narrow roads. Failure to yield the right-of-way is listed as one of the main causes.

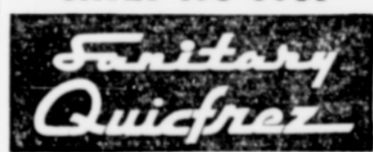

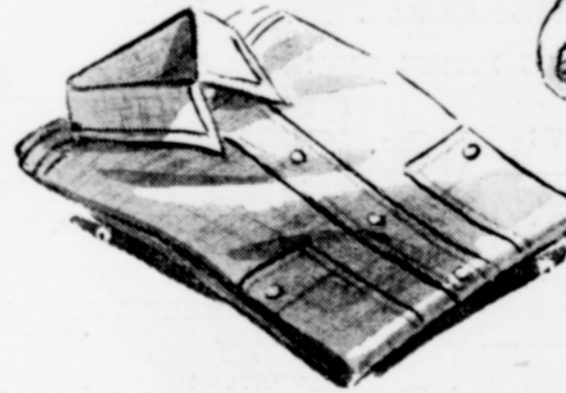

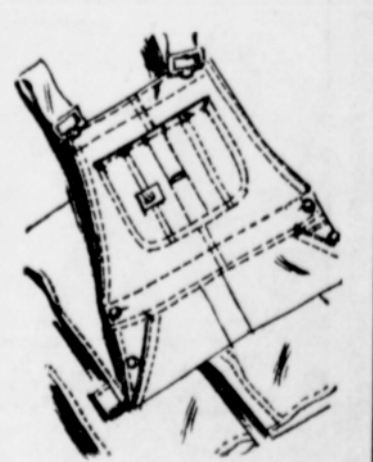
