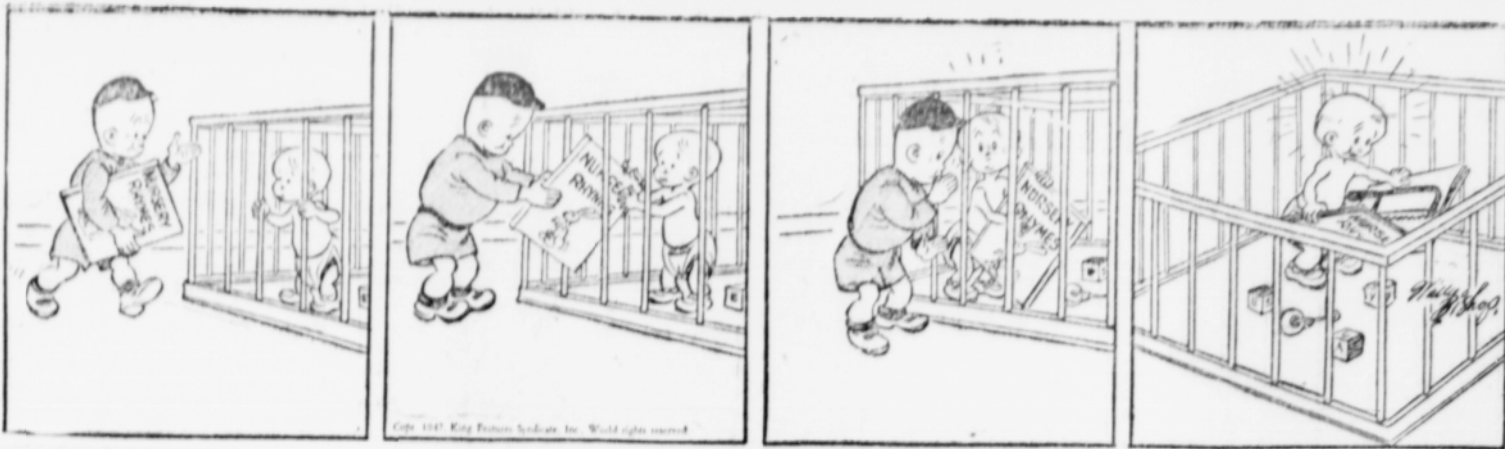

News Highlights Of the Week

Dewey, Warren Named

Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York receives unanimous vote on third ballot for Republican nomination for president at G. O. P. convention in Philadelphia Thursday. Governor Earl Warren of California was nominated by acclamation Friday for the vice-presidential nomination.

Berlin Americans Rationed

Americans and Britons in Berlin were subjected to partial rationing Sunday as the Russian land blockade of the city went into its second week.

Soviet Marshal Sokolovsky expressed the hope Tuesday that the Berlin crisis can be solved before food supplies are exhausted, the Russian-licensed news agency reported.

One tired old barrage balloon raised a false scare Wednesday that the Russians were putting up a new obstacle to the aerial food ferry route into Soviet-blockaded Berlin.

Red Bosses Blast Tito

The communist denounced Marshal Tito's leadership of Yugoslav Communists Monday and declared he and other "Socialist" leaders in Belgrade must hew to the Moscow line or get out.

The executive committee of the Yugoslavia Communist party Wednesday proposed a Yugoslav-Bulgarian-Albanian federation, but at the same time called for full cooperation with the Soviet Union.

Accuses Russia of Lies and Slander

In angry defiance, Yugoslavia's Community party accused the Russian-led Communists Tuesday night of lies and slander. It declared firmly its relations with Russia "must be based on confidence and not on envy."

Draft Bill Signed

President Truman last Thursday signed the peacetime draft bill and two appropriation measures that give over \$10 billion to the army, navy and air force.

Quake Hits Japan

Earthquake and fire destroyed the city of Fukui and surrounding towns in a 20 by 10 mile area Monday. High casualty list expected.

British Leave Palestine

The last British troops left the soil of troubled Palestine Wednesday, thus ending 31 years of British military occupation of the Holy Land.

Forest Fire Raging

The first major forest fire of the season had covered an estimated 3000 acres in northeast Washington county, Tuesday and was reported out of control and spreading south as Oregon and Washington were experiencing

some of the hottest weather of the year.

Coal Strike Peril Fades

Threat of nationwide coal strike lifted Thursday with an announced agreement between John L. Lewis and the soft coal industry on a new contract.

Quake Claims 3155 Dead

Estimated toll in Fukui's quake disaster placed Wednesday by U. S. military government officials at 3155 dead and 7320 seriously injured.

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Record Papers, Veterans Urged

The value to war veterans of recording their military discharges in the county court house was poignantly brought out by the recent Vanport disaster, where countless numbers of these documents are presumed to have been lost, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs said this week.

For those veterans who had recorded their discharges, there should be no delay in applying for GI benefits or other rights to which they may be entitled, because photographs may be obtained easily from the county recorder. These are bona fide copies and can be used for virtually all occasions where proof of military service is required.

Those who neglected to have their discharges recorded will find it necessary to apply for a certificate in lieu of lost discharge, which usually results in considerable delay because the applications must be processed in Washington, D. C.

Approximately 2000 veteran families were flooded out at Vanport, besides many in other lowland areas. While no one knows how many lost their discharges in the Co. of Portland, encouraged people this week to participate in the old family custom of picnicing on the summer holiday. Shute park has provided more picnic tables and other facilities that will enable many families to enjoy the home prepared meals while attending the July 3, 4 and 5 celebration.

disaster, nor how many had neglected to record their discharges, it is assumed by counselors in the Portland office of the Department of Veterans' Affairs that hundreds were caught short, judging from the numbers applying daily for certificates in lieu of lost discharge papers.

There is no charge in any county in Oregon, for recording discharge certificates, and veterans are urged to take advantage of this service because it provides a permanent record of military duty and makes it easy to obtain copies when circumstances demand swift service.

Rural Areas Big Highway Killers

A warning to motorists who persist in regarding traffic risks as confined primarily to congested areas is contained in a report issued by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry showing straight roads to be the scene of the greatest number of highway deaths.

One-third of all accidents occur on a straight, level stretch, and they in turn account for almost one-half the deaths. Intersections chalk up nearly half the accidents, but one-fifth of the fatalities, Newberry said.

Leading locations from the standpoint of risk, however, are curves, the secretary declared. Producing fewer than eight per cent of all accidents, curves are the scene of nearly 22 per cent of fatalities.

Newberry pointed out that most of the fatal accidents occur in rural areas, describing a typical tragedy as occurring in daylight, clear weather, road dry and straight, and at a speed below 50 miles per hour.

This may come as a shock to those drivers who are accustomed to blame most accidents on abnormal weather or road conditions, the secretary declared. "Actually it

clearly emphasizes the fact that drivers and carelessness are responsible for nearly every fatality in the books."
