

### Normal Travel Conditions for Oregon Cited

An intensive advertising campaign designed to inform tourists that normal travel conditions exist in Oregon and the northwest following the Columbia river flood, has been inaugurated by the state highway department in neighboring states, it was announced today.

The Oregon State Motor association suggested the campaign, following a survey conducted by the association, which disclosed a 25 per cent drop in tourist business in this state, following the flood.

The survey, conducted among motor court and hotel operators along major highway routes in Oregon, showed the decrease in tourist business to be general throughout the state, the association said. Decreases ranged from five per cent to as high as 75 per cent in individual instances.

Owners reported these reasons for the decline:

1. Adverse publicity on the Columbia flood, causing people to cancel trips already planned, or plan their vacations in other areas.
2. The late season, resulting in slow business during the first part of the summer.
3. High cost of traveling.

Since the publicity on the flood was the number one cause of the tourist decline, the association board of directors adopted a resolution, suggesting that the state highway commission immediately conduct an advertising campaign in neighboring states, informing prospective tourists that normal travel conditions now exist in Oregon and other northwest areas.

The commission, through John A. Laing, chairman of the advertising advisory committee, notified the association that it had decided to expend funds originally allocated to a fall campaign, to the immediate job of dispelling the impression that the flood has disrupted motor travel in this area.

"The committee feels that the campaign at this time will disperse the idea that danger or in-

convenience may be encountered in travel in this area, and that the campaign will be as effective in stimulating late travel as the one originally planned for the fall period, Laing said.

The Motor Association's survey disclosed many travelers today are seeking less expensive vacations, the association reported. Tourists were found checking the costs of accommodations, whereas immediately after the war, tourists sought accommodations with no thought of the cost. In many instances, less expensive accommodations are requested, indicating tourists today are inclined to "shop around" for lower rates.

### Cheese Factory Burns Near Roy

The old cheese factory near Roy, which was built many years ago by the Portland Cheese company, but had not been in use for a number of years, was burned to the ground Tuesday last week.

It was located across the highway from the home of the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. George Corey, north of Roy. Mr. Corey was cleaning up around the building and set fire to a pile of rubbish. Soon the wind veered and the building was in flames immediately with no hopes of saving it, although the neighbors and the Forest Grove fire department rushed to the scene immediately. Sparks flew across the highway to roofs on some of the Corey buildings, but were soon extinguished.

The fire recalls that president of the Portland Cheese company, Mr. Schneider, was killed years ago in an auto and railroad accident at the crossing at Witch Hazel. He was accompanied by his family and all in the car were killed.

budget for predatory animal control.

Further action on the above was possible during the afternoon session.

Back Service Officer  
 Melvin G. Hieber, Brink and Melvin G. Hieber among those speaking for making available to the county service officer \$1200 of state money which has been going into the general fund. The budget committee indicated that it was considering this.

W. G. Hare spoke strongly in favor of increasing the salaries of the elective officials, stating that their pay is "misgerardly" in comparison with living costs and their responsibility. "We've been getting service and we haven't been paying for it," he declared. "Washington county has a group of officials of which it may be proud."

E. J. McAlear urged immediate action to put the salaries on a higher level, stating that reasonable increases to the officials could be made at very little cost to each taxpayer. "The money I pay for taxes gives the greatest value of any money I pay out," he concluded.

Neal Bush spoke highly of the work of the county service officer, and said more funds would be needed to assure having a person in the local office at all times. Hieber said there are upwards of 7000 veterans in the county and that hundreds are contacting the service officer for help.

Brink said the county has a moral obligation to provide proper service for its many veterans.

### Health for All

Health for All  
 VISITING TB PATIENT

If a member of your family or a friend is in a tuberculosis hospital, probably you visit him as often as you can. These visits can contribute directly to his cure if they are timed right, if hospital rules are observed and if visitors are cheerful and understanding while with the sick patients.

A person who has a cold or some other illness should postpone his visit until he is perfectly well because the patient might catch his cold. The sick person needs all his strength to fight his tuberculosis. An additional illness, such as a cold, might over-tax and weaken his body defenses.

Visitors at the tuberculosis hospital or sanatorium should make it a point to learn and observe the regular visiting hours. A visitor who comes at the wrong time may interrupt meals, rest periods or medical examinations. Hospital authorities are compelled to refuse admittance to visitors who come at the wrong time. This means a waste of the visitor's time and keen disappointment for the patient if he finds out the visitor has been there and left without seeing him.

Other hospital rules warn against sitting on the patients' bed, kissing him and handling his belongings. When a visitor keeps these regulations, he protects himself against tuberculosis germs and the patient against the germs that might be brought in from the outside.

The wise visitor will bring the sick person only the pleasant news from home and avoid talking about family worries and petty troubles that will make him restless and unhappy.

The visitor should encourage the patient to co-operate fully with his doctor and the hospital personnel because they know what is best for him. For instance, it isn't easy for

The visitor can help by reminding the patient that the doctor is the one best qualified to say what progress is being made against the disease. He can point out to the patient that a premature discharge against medical advice might mean a more serious breakdown in the future.

The intelligent visitor can be a real tonic to the patient and a pleasure to the hospital personnel who know what is best for the patient. Such a visitor will have the patient well and home that much sooner.
