Results of 2, 4-D To Be Observed

A morning meeting to observe the results of 2,4-D used to control annual and perennial weeds in wheat, barley and flax fields was held at the old Johnson house north of Oregon at 10 a.m. today, July 15, according to a notice from the county agent.

The chemical has been used for weed control purposes on the county farm for three years, having been used as a selective in various crops. At this meeting there will be an opportunity to also see the control of annual weeds to look through the use of 2,4-D. The meeting is being called early in the morning to give to the farmers who may be busy with their crops an opportunity to attend the demonstration and also to see the results of the work of the time the dew is off.

Racing Record Broken Sunday

Shorty Clement, Beaverton, did get auto pilot, set a new lap record on the Hillsboro speedway Sunday for the second week in succession. He circled the quarter-mile track in 17.30 seconds, bettering the record of 18.30 he set a week earlier. The previous record, set last year, was 20.05 seconds.

Better times are expected to be set weekly on the Hillsboro track as continuous improvements harden the surface and help eliminate dust. The track, formerly the famous Valley rodeo grounds, will be swept and another coat of asphalt emulsion applied before the coming race, according to Stan New, secretary of the Portland club sponsors the races.
