

MacKenzie Nine Opens Playoffs At Tillamook

Coaches Jim Anderson and B. M. Goodman will send their local MacKenzie Motors American Legion nine into action at 2 p. m. Sunday at Tillamook in the opener of a best two out of three series from which will emerge the District 1 champion.

The MacKenzie nine earned the right to tackle the western division champions, Tillamook, Sunday when Banks fell before the local attack, 7-4. The strong coast team roared through its western division schedule without dropping a game in five tilts played. Tillamook downed Seaside and Astoria twice each and Vernonia once.

The coast team's ace pitcher is Bob Flatz, who has developed a sparkling mound record during the season's play. Tillamook also can call on Bob Riggert for mound duty. Riggert won two out of three ball games at the start of the league slate, allowed only four hits in 18 innings pitched. In the other tilt, Flatz allowed one blow.

The teams will come to Hillsboro August 1 to wind up the playoff. If the teams split the first two games, a second tilt will be played at Hillsboro to decide the owner of the district crown.

Anderson and Goodman probably will send burly Dick Waibel to the hill for the opener at Tillamook.
