Letters painting a true picture of life in Dutch Guiana were received this week by Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Messer of Aloha Mining company from Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stowell and Mr. and Mrs. James Shaffer. They were transferred down there from Hillsboro by the company in July for a two year stay.

"Paranam is above all my expectations," every house is built and furnished with the best. The lovely gardens for every home, kept up by a company gardener. The flowers are more beautiful than any I've ever seen before. We all miss the Oregon vegetables, however, for there are no fresh ones here at all. Behind our new home is a banana plantation, also oranges and grapefruit trees. Insect control is a thing I should have about. There are very few mosquitoes or any kind of bugs. No snakes—only lizards which flit around the yard and won't come near you. The houses have been sprayed by D.D.T. by company gardeners. There has been no malaria in the colony. Only milk is carried, no cows here.

Mrs. Shaffer commented "all the Aloha people met us at the plane with flowers and they have been giving parties, etc. for us. Servants are very cheap—we have a cook, maid, laundress and gardener. We have to learn to speak Dutch to talk to them. Shops are not too bad, but oh, one gags when entering the local butcher shops." Both couples and their children, who stood the trip beautifully, left New York City by air on July 2 and arrived at Paramaribo, Dutch Guiana on July 4. Mrs. Stowell concluded, "I only hope we can come back here when our time here is up, for I know of no more perfect place than Hillsboro."

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Camp Fire Girls News of the Week
