

Two Youths Meet Death On 'Cycles'

Tillamook, Aloha
Accidents Result
Fatally for Pair

Two motorcycle accidents Sunday claimed the lives of John Norbert Waibel, route 2, Cornelius, and Cleland Frye, 25, Hillsboro. The accident in which Waibel met death occurred at Aloha while the crash involving Frye happened north of Tillamook.

Services for Frye will be conducted at 2 p.m. Saturday at Donahoe & Sewell chapel, with interment following in Fir Lawn cemetery. The Waibel rites were Wednesday at St. Matthews church, with Father John T. Costelloe officiating. Interment was in Mt. Calvary cemetery.

Waibel died in St. Vincent's hospital in Portland Sunday night after the Aloha accident which occurred about 10 o'clock the same night. State Patrolman Vernon R. Boyer, who investigated the accident, said that the motorcycle being ridden by Waibel collided with a car driven by Richard E. Demuth, box 6, Aloha. Demuth reported he was making a left turn off the highway near the Wheeler avenue intersection in Aloha, when Waibel's motorcycle, moving west, struck his car on the right side. Millicent O'Neal, 24, route 4, Hillsboro, who was riding behind Waibel, suffered minor injuries in being thrown clear.

Survivors Listed

Waibel was born April 13, 1926, at Hillsboro. Survivors include a brother, Richard, route 2, Cornelius, a half-brother, Francis A. Hillsboro, and a sister, Celestine Bush, Portland; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Waibel, route 2, Cornelius. A brother, Maurice, died of wounds received in World War I, August 3, 1918.

Also killed in the Tillamook accident was Louis A. Smith, 24, Tillamook. Frye and Smith were riding behind Harold Rabolt of Tillamook on one machine when they fell from the motorcycle and were struck accidentally by a car being driven by Francis F. Schmidt, Cornelius. The accident happened on the approach to the south bridge on the Tillamook-Netsai road. Schmidt told police the two men tumbled into the road directly in front of his car. The driver of the motorcycle kept his seat and was uninjured.

Frye is survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Frye of Hillsboro, a brother, Murray, Cornelius, two sisters, Marjorie Watson, route 4, Hillsboro, and Sissy, Hillsboro.

He was born at Agnes in December, 1922. He played forward on the football team at Tillamook in 1942. The team was coached by Levee (Hap) Harnhorn. Frye was awarded the Harnhorn sportsman trophy after a rotary dinner after the 1942 season.

Kid's Place at Hillsboro, operated by the father of the deceased, and Jerry's Tavern at Cornelius, operated by his brother, Murray, will be closed from 1 to 2 p.m. Saturday for the funeral.

Lineman Injured In 30-foot Fall

A West Coast Telephone company lineman suffered a broken back and fractured right arm when he fell 30 feet from a telephone pole at the corner of Third avenue and East Lincoln street in Hillsboro Tuesday morning.

Gordon Johnson, 36, of Oberlin St., Portland, was taken to St. Vincent's hospital, Portland, by ambulance following the accident. X-rays revealed that Johnson's back was fractured in three places, according to the West Telephone company's Forest Grove office.

Johnson, who has been employed by the West Coast Telephone for two years, slipped as he was fastening his belt to start work on the 30-foot pole. Force of the fall was evidently taken on his right arm. His back was fractured when he fell across the street curbing. Johnson's condition was reported as fair by St. Vincent's hospital Wednesday morning.

Sunset Bar-B-Q Schedules Ample Walkathon Prizes

Plans for the Sunset chamber of commerce "Bunyan Derby" scheduled for August 14 and 15, and Portland to Hillsboro were announced this week by Ray J. Vanderzanden, president of the sponsoring organization. Vanderzanden, former Gonzaga university football star (1936-39), stated that "Bunyan Derby" contestants will be required to travel on foot, walk or run, a distance of approximately 75 miles, starting in Portland Grand Park Bowl on Saturday morning, August 15, at the Sunset Chamber of Commerce's annual Pit Bar-B-Q in Banks.

An anticipated field of 35 contestants will cover the Derby course in competition for \$1750 in prize money offered by the sponsoring organization. Distribution of the cash awards will be as follows: First, \$1000; second, \$500; third, \$250, plus special lap prizes and awards offered by several of the communities along the derby route.

Contestants in this first annual classic will start the rugged journey simultaneously from Grand Park bowl on Saturday, August 14, at approximately 2 p.m. From the starting point they will proceed across N. E. 33rd avenue to Sandy boulevard and then south on McLoughlin boulevard to Oregon City via Milwaukie. Oregon Territory Centennial celebrants will cheer the derby competitors down Oregon City's Main street and across the bridge to West Linn.

Demise Set For Historic Local School

David Hill Building
Ordered Wrecked
By Board Members

A landmark of an era of education in Hillsboro was on its way to disappearance as a result of action last week by the school board which brought a call for bids on the wrecking of the old David Hill school and construction of a new cafeteria and physical education facility on a portion of the old site.

Bids will be opened August 9 for the razing of the venerable structure, which has served grade school needs here since before the turn of the century.

The older part of the building, the north section of which was completed in 1889, will topple first, according to plans announced by J. W. Poynter, grade school superintendent. The cafeteria now located on the second floor of the north section will be moved temporarily to the south section, upstairs, until the new dining facilities have been completed. The front section and the connecting wing will be wrecked first in order to allow work to begin on the new structure which will match the architecture of the new David Hill building. The south section and the wing were built about 40 years ago, Poynter stated.

The planned new cafeteria and kitchen will measure 42 by 37 feet while the physical education room will have dimensions of 61 by 42 feet, with a 15-foot ceiling clearance. The kitchen will have new equipment with the exception of the stove and refrigerators, which (Continued on Page 2)

Milk Price Rise Indicated After Portland Jump

Indications came Wednesday from three major milk suppliers in the Hillsboro area that the 14-cent a quart rise in price decreed for the Portland sales area also will be effective here August 1. The Portland price increase followed the Portland price scale.

Fred Scheller, co-owner of Aloha Dairy, pointed out that local prices have always followed Portland figures, and would do so August 1. Scheller expected a great reaction from the state agriculture department "within a few days" that the price increase would affect his output. Aloha Dairy milk goes to Portland and as a consequence, the scale there must be followed, he said.

Officials of Mayflower Milk, distributor for the Dairy Cooperative association, indicated that the price would be effective on their product.

Sam Hult of Morningview Dairy, which supplies only Hillsboro, expressed himself "quite certain" that he would follow the Portland scale after August 1.

The new price of a quart of standard milk will be 20¢ cents. The Portland price order, based on a hearing July 6-9, would also do this following:

1. Increase the payout to dairy farmers from its present level of \$1.40 per 100 pounds of milk plus \$1.15 per pound for the butterfat therein to a new scale of \$1.58 per hundredweight and \$1.16 per pound of fat.
2. Establish four retail classifications of milk with varying butterfat contents of (a) 3.2 to 3.8 per cent, (b) 3.9 to 4.3 per cent, (c) 4.4 to 5.2 per cent and (d) 10 per cent.
3. Reaffirm a previous order calling on milk dealers to label outer containers with the minimum butterfat content of the milk or cream inside.
4. Redefine the Portland sales area to include "substantially all of the territory in the greater Portland district, inclusive of a portion of Washington county."

Distributors will get about one cent and producers the remaining half cent of the price increase, according to State Director of Agriculture Ervin L. Peterson.

'Welcome' Theme Strong For Court House Lawn

The friendly spirit which Hillsboro strives to maintain is typified nowhere within its limits as well as in the verdant confines of the court house block, where neatly-clipped grass, decorative shrubs and flourishing flowers beckon to the passer-by.

Many communities which have summer sanctuaries of this sort make them cold by putting up signs for "No Parking," "No Loitering Prohibited," and other terse warnings to repel the public. The only coldness appearing in Washington county's park is that produced by the thick foliage of many trees which make its confines an oasis on a hot day.

There's a man who is largely responsible for this state of affairs, for both the neat appearance and the welcome absence of signs which make the park a place to enjoy rather than just to look at. The man's name is Joe Mulcrone and his position: Washington county jailer.

Proud of Jail, Too
Joe is proud of his court house lawn—almost as proud as he is of his jail, which is kept in spotless condition. With the help of trustees, he is able to give both an appearance which welcomes close inspection.

Joe has a philosophy about his oasis of green in the midst of Hillsboro.

"We want people to enjoy what we work so hard to maintain," he said, "and you know, 99 per cent of the people are very, very good."

Davis Tells Fair Swine Show Plans

Chairman of School
Exhibit Also Reports
Progress of Work

Emphasis will be placed on the open swine classes at the Washington county fair this year for the first time in over 10 years, it was stated this week by Leon S. Davis, fair manager. Over 100 swine pens are being assigned this year, he reported, and indications are that exhibitors other than F. F. A. and 4-H members will go as high as 15. The past average has been much lower, he pointed out.

R. Hornecker, route 5, Hillsboro, is superintending the swine show, the manager said. In preparation for the emphasis on the swine divisions, the barn at the fairgrounds is being enlarged, Davis stated. Work has started on the Quonset type building which will house the new school exhibit, an innovation with this year's fair. A large crew also is repairing all buildings and clearing grounds in preparation for the September event.

Additional Space

The fair board has arranged for the use of 15,000 square feet of space in the half-block west of the fair buildings, Davis reported. This area will provide for the livestock open class, with two cattle rings and room for both junior and senior exhibitors. An exhibit building will be used for exhibits, he pointed out.

Horseshoe courts for the state tournament scheduled to be run off during the fair are being constructed also. Premium books, which will be ready soon, Davis said, will be mailed to all of last year's exhibitors.

School Exhibit Plans

Plans for the elementary school exhibit are progressing under the direction of Val Bullis, principal of Aloha-Huber school and Mrs. E. A. Deaville, who was appointed chairman of the committee in charge. The school exhibit will consist of art work—posters, murals and booklets—many training projects and handicrafts.

In order that small schools won't have to compete with larger ones, three divisions have been established: A. Schools with eight or more teachers; B. three to eight teachers; and C. one and two-room schools. Prizes will be awarded only for manual training projects. The chairman announced. Each piece of work exhibited should have the pupil's name and grade attached. Announcement as to day and place for entry of exhibits will be made in next week's Argus, Mrs. Deaville reported.

All of the MacKenzie men will be in top shape for the clash, the coaches announced Tuesday. The return of Pete Klein, heavy-hitting backstop, has strengthened the club. He set two hits, including a triple, in payoff spots last Sunday.

The coaches indicated they will stick with the lineup which gave the first victory. The first meeting between the teams, which means that Klein will be behind the bat, Jim Niemman will be at second, Bobby Adams at short, Ray Rothstrom at third. The outfield will be Ron Reule, left; Roger Madsen, center, and Lee Alvord, right.

Midget Races Set For Speedway

Plenty of thrills are promised local racing fans when drivers head their roaring midgets around the oval in the fifth race of the season at the Hillsboro Speedway Sunday afternoon. Time trials are set for 1:30 p.m. and racing events will start at 2:30 p.m.
