

High School Credits Still Available to Eligible Vets

It is still possible for Oregon World War II veterans who did not graduate from high school to earn a high school diploma or its equivalent by passing comprehensive examinations designed to measure one's educational maturity. The state department of veterans affairs notified Dolph Stuart, county veterans service officer, this week.

Thirteen high schools and three colleges in Oregon administer what are known as general educational development tests, to veterans only, who are bona fide Oregon residents and who have honorable discharges or are still in service, according to Henry W. Sorrick, supervisor of secondary education for the state department of education.

By passing these tests, which cover the fields of grammar, literature, mathematics, social studies and science, the veteran is entitled either to a certificate of equivalency from the state department of education or in some cases a diploma

from the high school he formerly attended, which is recognized for college entrance, civil service jobs and other employment where secondary education is required, Sorrick said.

Since April, 1946, the department of education has issued 534 such certificates to those who never attended high school. Many more veterans in Oregon received high school diplomas from their local high schools on the basis of passing the tests. In Portland, for example, more than 1900 veterans who passed the examinations since October of 1945 were recommended for diplomas, including 436 in the past year alone. Salem high has issued 206 such diplomas.

Charges for taking the exams range from \$2.50 to \$7. Veterans should apply at the nearest of the following centers, located in the local high school unless otherwise indicated:

Astoria, Baker, Bend, Eugene, Heppner, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Coos Bay, Ontario, Pendleton, Salem, The Dalles and Portland (Guidance and Counseling Center, 220 N. E. Beech St.). Colleges offering the tests are Oregon State, Reed and Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland.

In regard to the National Service Life Insurance deadline of July 31, 1948, for reinstatement, it is pointed out by the secretary of the Public Law 888, approved June 29, 1948, which authorizes renewal of level premium term insurance under the N. S. L. act for the extended 5-year period, does not stop the reinstatement as of the end of this month.

Road Bridge Work Delayed

Completion date for the Road bridge, three miles southeast of Hillsboro on River road, has been extended to September 30. Ross T. Hartrampf, county roadmaster, announced this week. June 30 was the date set for completion when work was started last December.

High water, a shortage of materials and some unusual ground conditions are reasons for the extended completion date, Hartrampf said.

Among other projects of the county engineering department is a grading job which will eliminate a dangerous curve on the Shady Brook road two miles west of North Plains. This work will be completed the latter part of next week.

Seal coat work is to start Thursday on roads throughout the county. The road crew will begin the southeastern part of the county, and progress toward the western part.

Board Schedules David Hill Wrecking

will be moved from the old installation, the superintendent said.

Bids on the entire project—including wrecking of the old building—are expected to come in bearing figures of approximately \$33,000, Poynter reported.

The full basement under the old building will be retained under the south section for use as a recreation area during inclement weather while the remainder of the basement will be filled in.

Moving Scheduled

The moving of the cafeteria to the south section of the old building will be effected before school opening, Poynter said. Annand & Kennedy, Portland architectural-engineering firm, is handling the project.

Finishing touches on the new David Hill building will be seeding of the lawn strip between the sidewalk and the structure on Fourth avenue, and the seeding of another strip along the east side of the building, the superintendent said. This work is planned for fall.

In removing the old building, wreckers will be destroying the second school building erected in Hillsboro. The first school was built at the corner of Third and Baseline and was replaced by the present building, which is soon to meet its end.

Remodeling High

The move for destruction of the building came as a result of prohibitive remodeling costs, the superintendent said.

The block on which both the old and new Hill buildings stand was bought from Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wehrung in October, 1898, for the princely sum of \$1100, according to deed on file in the superintendent's office. When David Hill was first opened, only six rooms were finished, five downstairs and one upstairs, according to Calvin Jack, who attended the school in 1891. The first freshman classes in Hillsboro were conducted on the second floor of the building, after which the building was started by the late B. W. Barnes in 1904.

The building, with its newer sections, presently contains 16 classrooms, two of which have been used for the cafeteria.
