

Rites Saturday For Pfc. Frost At Reedville

REEDVILLE — Funeral services for Pfc. Rolland Dale Frost, 22, who was killed in action on Luzon in the Philippines January 13, 1945, while serving with the artillery, will be held at the Reedville Presbyterian church at 2 p. m. Saturday. Burial will be at Reedville cemetery.

The body was sent home on the U. S. S. Sgt. Morris E. Crain and is due to arrive Thursday.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Frost of route one, Aloha, he enlisted September, 1940, in the Oregon National Guard, was sent to Fort Lewis with the 41st division, later transferred to the 25th division and left Fort Lewis for overseas December 6, 1941. He served in Hawaii, Guadalcanal, the Solomons, New Georgia and was killed in the landing on Luzon. A posthumous award of the Purple Heart was made to him.

He was a graduate of the Reedville school.

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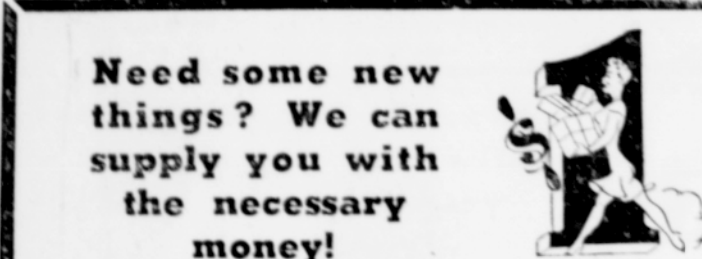
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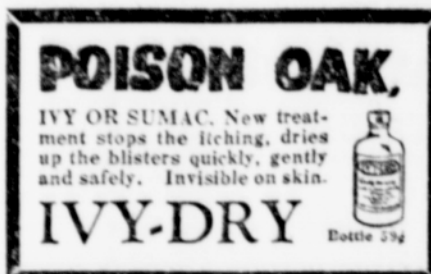


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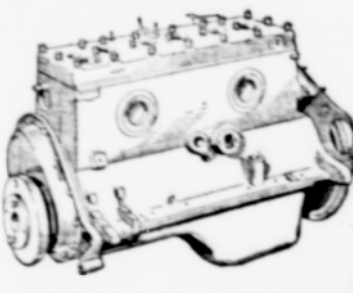
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
