## Lilly Clan Holds Annual Reunion

The Lilly Clan of Oregon held their annual reunion, Sunday at Shute Fork. There were 175 seated at the large picnic table. Members and friends came from Portland, Tillamook, Waldport, Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Banks, Gale Creek and Newberg. Many others from far and near were unable to attend.

The members of the clan, who met at the reunion, are all descendants of David Lilly, who came to Oregon in 1834 and settled at Gale Creek, where the old home still remains. His daughter, Esther Hurdley, lives there now. His other daughter, Emma Hines, lives in Forest Grove. They are his only living children left.

The Lilly ancestors can be traced back 100 years to the town of Lille, France, and to John and Robert de Lille of Normandy, France, who with William the Conqueror invaded England in 1066. The first Lilly to come to America landed in Virginia in 1634. "Look" magazine, November issue, carried several pages of the West Virginia Lilly Clan Reunion which holds its annual reunion on Flat Top Mountain in West Virginia, with 10,000 members.

A special carnival travels several hundred miles to entertain at each of these reunions and a small scale aerial armada of light planes, flown overhead with light-seers. The oldest member is "Uncle" Pleasant Lilly, 102 years.

The oldest member of Oregon's Lilly clan is Belle Lilly, 87, of Cornelius and Sandra Lee Hurdley, age one month, is the youngest. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. Hurdley of Gale Creek.
