The repair of the present quarters was put in the hands of Hoffman, Selfridge and Ehrke. This committee is to inquire about repairing and redecorating of the rooms and report back at the next meeting.

Woman Leader Buried Monday

Mrs. Margaret Nichol Stroeve died Friday at home on route 3, Beaverton, after an extended illness. Funeral services were held Monday morning at the Riverview Abbey Mausoleum with Rev. Albert King officiating.

Mrs. Stroeve was born in Basswood, Manitoba, Canada, March 3, 1892, and came to the United States a year later. She was principal of the Cedar Mill school for five years, president of the Hillsboro Business and Professional Women's club in 1947-48, the first president of the Beaverton Book club, and a member and trustee of the Beaverton Bethel Congregational church.

Survivors include her husband, Henry W. Stroeve Sr.; son, Henry J., a sister, Mrs. Elsie Underwood of Beaverton; and four brothers, Andrew Nichol of Salinas, Cal., Douglas of Hendrum, Minn., Donald of Portland, and Frank of Long Beach, Cal. She was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Adam Nichol.

Mrs. Stroeve attended grade, high school, and teachers' college and began her teaching career in Minnesota. She left Minnesota to go to Dickinson, N. D., where she was demonstration teacher and critic for the North Dakota Teachers' college. She resided for a year at Yakima, Wash., where she was put in charge of revising the course of study for the Yakima grade schools. In the fall of 1925 she moved to Seattle and taught the first grade in the old Central school.

In 1928 she was married to Henry W. Stroeve at Alexandria, Minn., where they made their home until 1937, when they moved to Beaverton.

Mt. Calvary Body Identity Reported By County Coroner

The body of an elderly man found last week southwest of Mt. Calvary cemetery near Portland has been identified as that of Andrew Hoerth, 60, route 4, Sherwood. It was reported Wednesday by Coroner Fred Sewell.

Identification was made through personal belongings, physical characteristics and discovery of the cut bottoms of overalls, which matched the pair the deceased was wearing, in his cabin on the farm of Wilbur Hoerthson, Rt. 4, Sherwood. Identification of the remains was made by the crime laboratory of the state police, assisted by Sgt. Walter Hadfield.

A report to the county sheriff's office by Gus Mifert, Sherwood chief of police, first led investigators to believe that the body was that of Hoerth. Mifert reported that the missing man had lived around Sherwood for a number of years. He left Sherwood during the first part of April, Mifert reported, and went to Beaverton, where he met George Howell. The pair then went to Portland and separated at the Labor temple. Hoerth had not been heard from since.

Death was presumed to be from natural causes. Survivors include two brothers, William, Portland, and Francis, Salem. Final rites for the deceased were conducted at Riverview Abbey crematorium.

Oregon's Traffic Death Rate Down

Heavy travel and fewer traffic deaths in the first five months of the year have combined to produce a substantial lowering of Oregon's traffic death rate, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry has revealed.

The death rate, which is the number of traffic fatalities for each 100 million miles of actual travel, averaged 7.2 at the end of May. Average death rate for all of 1947 was 8.5, Newberry pointed out, however, that deaths have climbed sharply with the arrival of the

summer travel season and that gains made earlier in the year may be wiped out.

Death rate figures, based on total mileage as computed from gasoline consumption records, are used as an index of the actual danger involved in automobile travel.

"The rate is low because street and highway mileage is increasing faster than the number of traffic deaths," Newberry explained; "but more traffic means more exposure to accidents. Certainly there is a need for greater driving care than ever before."

He called on motorists and pedestrians alike to be doubly alert, especially on open highways. Of a total of 42 persons killed in June traffic accidents, 34 lost their lives in rural area smash-ups.
