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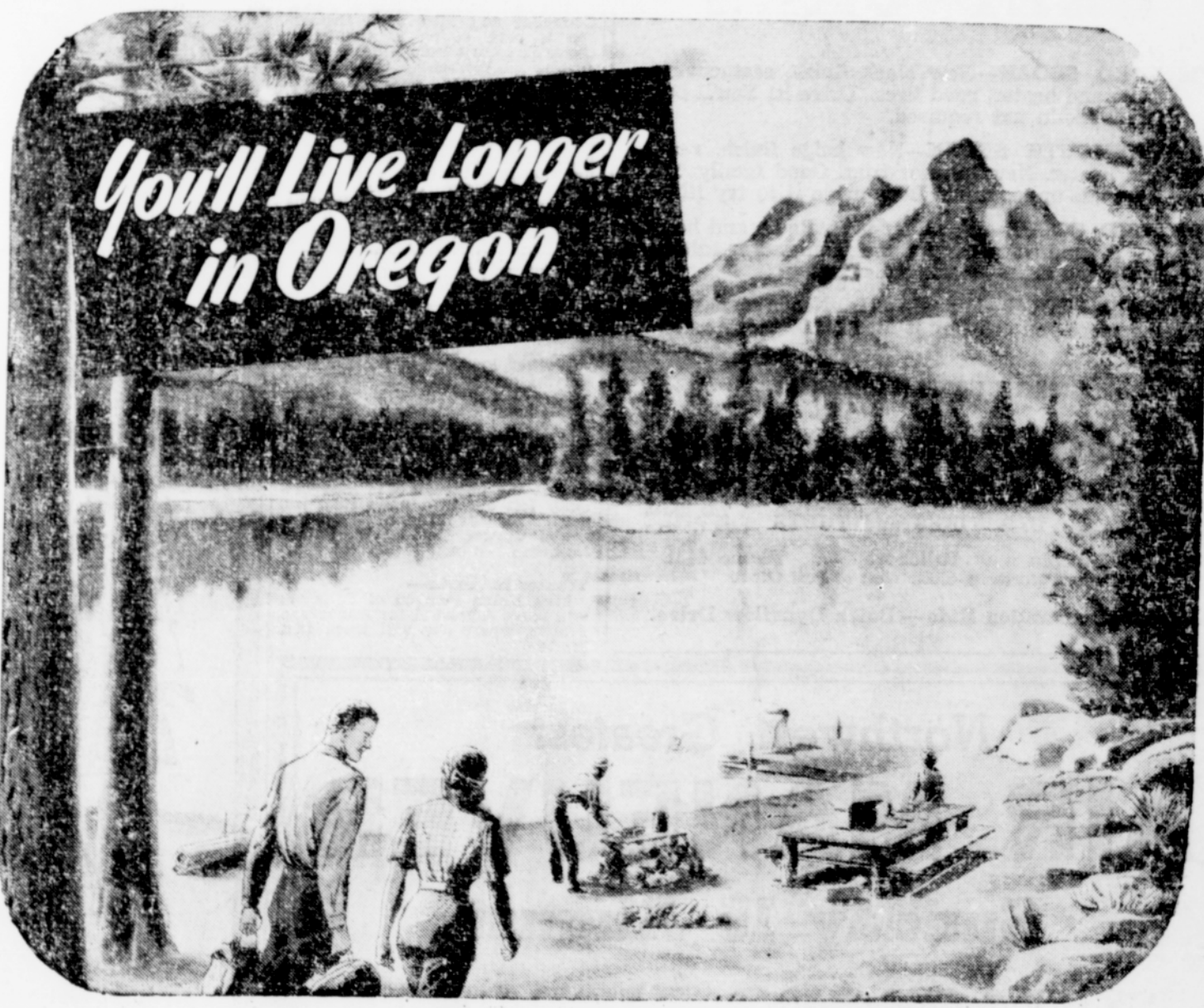
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Life Span Here Exceeds U. S. Average*

Oregonians can expect to live longer than the average United States citizen. Perhaps it's our climate of mild winters and cool, "air conditioned" summers.
