Rites Conducted For Sgt. Taylor

Graveside services were conducted Saturday at Forest View cemetery, Forest Grove, for Sgt. W. Brooks Taylor, 25, the first Pacific university student killed in World War II. He met death January 22, 1943, in the South Pacific.

He was first a member of the Sunset division but was later transferred to the 163rd infantry and sent to Australia, March 19, 1942. He was awarded the Purple Heart and Silver Star posthumously.

National Guardsmen acted as pallbearers. He was a graduate of Forest Grove high school and attended Pacific for one year.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Taylor, Forest Grove; two sisters, Mrs. Donald Zumwalt, Forest Grove, and Mrs. Verne Kelsey, Portland.

Post Office Job Opening Told

Applications for appointment as custodial laborer at the Hillsboro post office have been asked by the civil service commission.

Application should be filed with the director, 11th Civil Service region, Central building, Seattle, Wash., not later than August 10, according to the announcement. Applicants must reside within the place of the local post office or be bona fide patrons of the office. The entrance salary is \$2150 a year. Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 62 except that these limits may be waived for veterans and under certain conditions for war service indefinite employees.



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Huge West Slope Growth Shown; School Census Up

Washington county's West Slope section was the subject of a progress study and full page of pictures in a recent Oregonian, with emphasis put by Paul Laartz, Oregonian staff writer, on tremendous growth during the last 10 years.

Ten years ago the area consisted of a golf course, some farms and wooded area which spilled over into the Tualatin valley. Laartz points out The community of West Slope then included a service station and one store building.

Property valuation of the nine public school districts in the area has leaped from \$2,652,829.58 to \$3,487,630.00 in the 10-year period, according to Austin Scraftford, county school superintendent. This increase represents a gain of 105 per cent.

School Census Leaps
School census increases in the area during the last 10 years are represented by the following figures, the first being the 1938 figure and the second the 1948 total: Garden Home, 165-293; Raleigh Hills, 72-216; Sylvan, 102-247; Tualatin View, 53-9; Bonny Slope, 61-163; Barnes, 32-105; Beaverton, 526-1331; Cedar Mill, 99-163; Union, 75-117.

The school census rate of increase, 116 per cent, is even greater than the valuation jump.

Beaverton, the only incorporated city in the West Slope district, has increased its valuations from \$1,714,451.46 to \$2,327,043.60. Beaverton's population, estimated today at 2250, was figured at 1590 in 1945 and the census bureau counted 1952 in 1940.

Building Progress Told
L. J. Busse, Beaverton city recorder, was quoted by Laartz as predicting that 1948 building in Beaverton will exceed that of any previous three years. In progress now are the initial part of a \$250,000 Catholic church and a \$44,000 mor-
