

Pacific Summer Graduates Due To Get Diplomas

A summer convocation honoring Pacific university students who have completed the requirements for graduation at the close of the summer session, is scheduled for Wednesday, August 18 in the Marsh hall chapel at 2:00 p.m.

The recreation hall of the Sunbelt chamber, measuring 50 by 50 feet plus a 16 foot wing, will be used for the dances. Hahn has engaged Owe "Red" Dunning's orchestra, from radio station KOIN, for the Sunday night dance. Thrill rides and concessions will be available at the carnival, which is under the chairmanship of Bob Crop.

Farmhands, loggers, barber school students, hod carriers and representatives of numerous other laborers and skills—ranging in age from 16 to 60—have signed as contestants in the Bunyan Derby which will travel a roundabout route from Portland to Banks as a feature of the Bar-B-Q Tarty, two contestants, with the number due to be greater at post time, are completing training for the grueling jaunt.

Prize Money High

Each is eager to return home with the \$1000 first prize money, \$500 for second or at least the \$250 third prize. The derby is scheduled to start from Grant Park Bowl in Portland at approximately 3 p. m. Saturday. From the starting point, the contestants will proceed south on 3rd avenue to Sandy boulevard, then to Union avenue, continuing south on McLoughlin boulevard to Milwaukie and Oregon City.

The "walking men" will return to Portland via Barbours boulevard after passing through Oswego and Tigard. Following a brief control halt in Portland during the hours of darkness, the contestants will start out Canyon road through Beaverton, Aloha, Hillsboro, Cornelius and Forest Grove to the thousands of excited spectators who will crowd the finish line at the Bar-B-Q grounds in Banks. Derby officials expect the winner to cross the finish line shortly before noon Sunday.

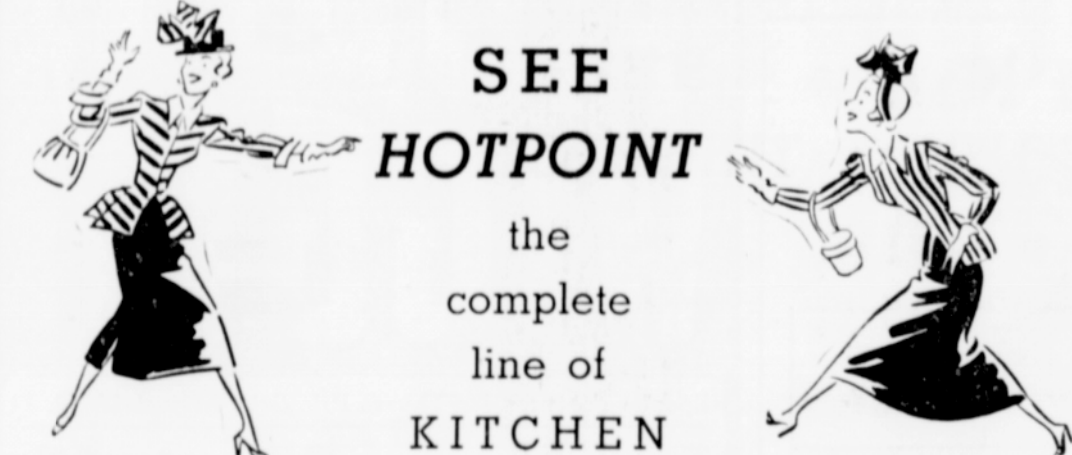
