

News Highlights Of the Week

Anti-Inflation Bill Signed
President Truman signed the recently approved anti-inflation measure and accused congress Monday of knocking down to special interests and choosing to "fight inflation by putting the average American family through the wringer." The measure gives him power to tighten up on consumer credit and bank lending. Truman had asked for more sweeping powers, including standby authority for price control and rationing.

Truman Sees Deficit
President Truman said Sunday the country faces a \$1,500,000,000 deficit and a near-record \$42,200,000,000 of peacetime spending with "deficit financing" looming indefinitely ahead. Republicans instantly charged the president with distorting and juggling figures.

Truman Hit
Chairman J. Parnell Thomas of the house un-American activities committee said Tuesday that President Truman has tried to conceal from the public information on Communist espionage.

Says American Spy
The Russians Sunday said an as-

sistant American embassy naval attaché, Lt. Robert Dreher, was caught in espionage activities in April and sent home a few days later at the request of the Soviet foreign office. The U. S. state department charged that Russian authorities actually framed the espionage charges.

Says Spy Hearing Interferes
Attorney General Clark said Sunday that congressional spy hearings have damaged government efforts to form a "sound basis for prosecution" in its Communist investigations.

Hiring Hall Held Violation
A trial examiner for the national labor relations board held Monday that the CIO National Maritime union and the CIO American Radio association violated the Taft-Hartley act when they demanded continuation of their "hiring halls" on the East and Gulf coasts.

Babe Ruth Dies
George Herman "Babe" Ruth, baseball's homerun king and the idol of all baseball fans, died in New York Monday night of a neck cancer at the age of 35. He was the most colorful figure baseball has known.
