Other features included a tour of the new VA regional outpatient clinic an afternoon's discussion on

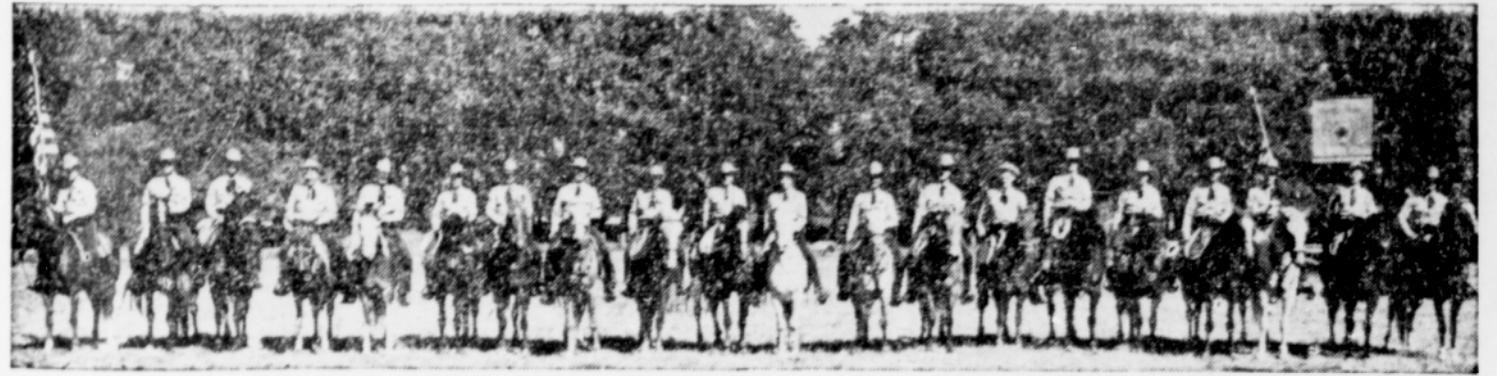
Health Exams Needed
