

Portlander Dies In Local Crash

Leonidas L. Watson, 5725 N.E. Cleveland, Portland, was dead Saturday after a head-on crash between his car and a truck at the corner of First Avenue and Baseline street in Hillsboro about 12:30 p.m. Saturday.

His wife, Lucy, a passenger in the car, was taken to Jones hospital with serious injuries.

Chief of Police Melvin DeBoek and Coroner Fred Sewell are investigating the possibility that Watson was struck with a heart attack before the accident. Watson, traveling east on Baseline street, was reported to have crossed to the left side of the street and continued in that lane of traffic for 150 feet before colliding with a truck.

The dividing line which determines the school to be attended by pupils in kindergarten through the fifth grade is Main street, Poynter said. Those living south of Main will attend David Hill while those north of the dividing line will go to Peter Boscow. This pupil may be assigned to either school depending on the enrollment in various grades. All sixth, seventh and eighth graders will go to B. W. Barnes.

Age Laws Stated
Oregon school laws state that first grade children must have reached the age of six on or before November 15 of the current year, while kindergarten may be five by the same date. Under the law, children of all grades may be denied entrance regardless of age, if they seek to enter school after the fourth week, the superintendent explained. Children past seven years of age are compelled to attend school unless excused because of a handicap.

Kindergarten pupils will attend for only half a day, Poynter said, and wherever possible, the parent's choice of sessions will be followed. Kindergarten pupils should be accompanied by parents on the first day of school, the superintendent recommended.
