

Need for Protection of U. S. Standards Stressed

We must protect and defend the form of government that gives us the highest standard of living known to man, declared R. L. Clark of Portland, president of the Pacific Wool Growers association, in speaking on a "Shrinking World" before the Hillsboro Rotary club Thursday.

After World war I we rehabilitated Europe and now we are attempting to do it again with a drain on the U. S. economy, according to Clark, who said it was a question as to whether the U. S. economy will stand such a drain. The thing we must think about is maintaining the standards within our own U. S., he said.

The United States, averred Clark, has the resources to sustain a population at a standard never before known to man. He asked what we were going to do about it, give it away or keep it. Hunger influences peoples to do many things to get the resources of wealthier neighbors. Clark said we were more concerned about world happenings now than before because we know more about them.

The only short answer to the meat shortage, the speaker held, is more production and a good return is necessary to bring this about. He said men strike for higher wages yet complain about high prices. Clark said he hoped that
