

Terminal Leave Deadline Nears, Stuart Reminds

The deadline for filing terminal leave applications is September 1, County Service Officer Dolph Stuart reminded veterans this week. If there is even a remote possibility that a veteran may be eligible for unused leave during any period of enlistment time during World War II—up to September 1, 1946—he should contact Stuart for help in filling out an application. The form must be notarized and filed with photostatic copy of discharge or notice of separation, before the deadline, Stuart pointed out.

The same deadline, September 1, applies to survivors of veterans who died after discharge (provided discharge was before September 1, 1946) and whose death occurred before they applied for terminal leave bonds. Application by survivors is supposed to be filed on a survivor's application form. Chances are that none of these forms are available locally. Survivors always have been directed to write the respective branches of the armed forces and request the necessary forms. However, time is too short now for such action. It is advised that these persons make application by letter. The addresses are listed under "General Instructions," page 4 of the regular terminal leave application blanks. The county service officer is qualified to assist in such cases.

Where a veteran has made appli-

cation for and has received a terminal leave bond, and then dies, leaving the bond in the possession of his survivor, the deadline cited in the previous paragraphs does not apply. Survivors in such cases, if they prefer, retain the bond until it accumulates the maximum interest (2½ per cent per annum for five years) and then make arrangements for cashing it in, Stuart said.

If in doubt, file an application. It is the advice given by the service officer. If any of the period of service between September 8, 1939, and September 1, 1946, was as an enlisted person, but you are not certain whether you had used all your leave, it is advisable to file an application and let the finance officer of your branch of the armed forces compute the leave. Those discharged after September 1, 1946, are presumed to have been paid for their unused leave at the time of discharge.

Literals Receive Medals of Son

ing calls has been done away with, and sequence of induction will be decided by classification and age.

The law automatically exempts veterans with at least 90 days' service between Pearl Harbor and V-J Day, or with 12 months' service between September 16, 1945, and June 24, 1948, the date the draft law went into effect. Also exempt by law are ordained ministers and objectors are exempt, but may be used in noncombatant activities if they do not protest.

Deferments Told

Also automatically deferred are high school students until graduation or until they reach the age of 23. College students are exempt for the remainder of their academic year.

President Truman Friday took advantage of his opportunity under the law to defer other groups. He listed them as follows:

IIA—Men involved in study, research or medical, scientific or other endeavors considered necessary to the national health, safety or interest. The deferments will be for one year or less and may be changed by the president or by local boards.

IIIC—Farm workers or men engaged in agricultural occupations.

IIIA—Anyone with a dependent. This can mean a married man who has a bona fide family relationship, a man whose induction would mean hardship to a dependent.

No Marriage Dates

The present ruling merely states that a married man is deferred, setting no dates before which his marriage would apply. Men married between the present date and their registration would be exempt, draft officials have said.

High points of the act were offered Tuesday by Dolph Stuart, county veterans' service officer, who reported an increasing number of inquiries about the provisions of the law.

All male citizens, ages 18 through 25, must register. Stuart pointed out, except the following: Members of the regular armed forces, members of reserve components while on active duty, students at military, naval and coast guard academies, active duty personnel of the public health service and the U. S. Coast and Geodetic survey and various diplomatic and consular personnel of foreign nations.

All others must register, even though they may be exempt from induction or qualify for deferments.

The initial registration schedule is as follows:

August 30, men born in 1922, after August 30, 1922.

August 31-September 1, men born in 1923.

September 2-3, men born in 1924.

September 4-5, men born in 1925.

September 6-7, men born in 1926.

September 8-9, men born in 1927.

September 10-11, men born in 1928.

September 12-13, men born in 1929.

September 14-15, men born in 1930, prior to September 19, 1930.

has misled only one class and is always active in discussions of better farming, according to instructors. The veterans' group met at Joe's place one week-end and erected a chicken house for him, and Joe furnished the lunch.

The Phillips brothers, who live on the adjacent tract and raise strawberries, bring him in to the classes when they meet at Hillsboro union high school.

The Veterans' Administration provides Joe with a reader, Jim York by name, who does the farm work and acts as a companion.

An old railroad logging camp, the land Joe owns is mountainous and overlooks Mountaineer, and is accessible only by a steep trail from the main road. Joe knows every inch of land; where the sheep are grazing, the location of his rabbit hutch, the hills where his corn is growing tall and green, and even the exact spot where his team is stabled in the large barn.

Plans Development

Plans for development on Joe's farm include a flock of 100 sheep, a tract of timber and a pasture for his sheep of subterranean clover, alfalfa and lucerne, lots of grass, hedges and trees. He has met and talked with Joe and is amazed at his lack of bitterness, his adjustment, and his highly commendable personality. When asked why he thought of the Germans, Joe answered: "Well, there are good people and bad people wherever you go. While in Germany he met several people who were thoughtful and kind to him. At present the American Red Cross chapter in Hillsboro has money generously donated by Joe to purchase powdered coffee, milk and eggs and soap for a German nurse who took care of him while he was in the hospital. They have been corresponding via the Red Cross, which has translated and written Joe's letter in German, expressing his gratitude.

The only bitterness that Joe bears is that regarding ex-servicemen who have two legs, two arms and two good eyes and still complain about "their rights," and what the government "owes" them. Joe firmly believes that if these veterans would own a piece of land like his, where the air is good and clean, and were kept busy engaged in hard work, they would soon forget their persecution complex. Good hard work is the answer, Joe stated.
