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Air Parcel Post Due September 1

Effective September 1, air parcel post service will be available from Hillsboro to all points in the country and to U. S. possessions. It was announced this week by L. T. McPheeters, local postmaster.

Packages to be sent by this new faster means must weigh over eight ounces, but not more than 70 pounds. McPheeters said. They must be not more than 100 inches in length and girth combined. The service is also available to army and navy postal installations overseas.

Packages sent by the new service will leave Hillsboro on the same schedule as regular parcel post, the postmaster stated.

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Morgan Explains Law on Livestock Handling in County

Many inquiries lately regarding the rights of owners to allow livestock to run at large in the northern part of Washington county brought an explanation of the law Wednesday from District Attorney G. Russell Morgan.

As explained by Morgan, there exists, under the old herd law, only two open range districts where livestock previously has been allowed to run at large in the county. In 1947, however, Morgan said, the legislature passed a law which directly affects all county livestock. The law is as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, either as owners or in possession or control of any horses, mules, cattle, swine, sheep or goats to permit the same to run at large on any highway or public road in Washington county."

A \$100 penalty has been provided for violators, the district attorney pointed out.

"The 1947 law is plainly worded and it means exactly what it says," Morgan said. He reported that he had conferred with Sheriff Dick Busch and they have decided to begin more stringent enforcement of the law.

Reports have come to county officials of strawberry patches being ruined by livestock and others of accidents on county roads caused by animals running at large. In such case, the owner is liable, Morgan warned.
