

Northwest Nut Growers Sets New Walnut Prices

Northwest Nut Growers Monday quoted 1943 opening in-shell French walnut prices to buyers which were two cents per pound higher than opening prices last year. The new prices were established by the board of directors of Northwest Nut Growers at a special meeting, and are based on a thorough study of improved conditions in this year's nut markets. John E. Trunk, general manager of Northwest Nut Growers, believes that prices in other major walnut producing areas will reflect the same market conditions, and will therefore be very close to those quoted by producers in Washington and Oregon, as represented by Northwest Nut Growers.

Plant prices: O. B. Oregon on in-shell French walnuts in 100 pound bags are: Blue Pirate—jumbo, 34½ cents; large, 32½ cents; medium, 29½ cents; Cascade—jumbo, 32 cents; large, 30 cents; medium, 28 cents; baby, 23 cents; Omega—jumbo, 27 cents; large, 25 cents; medium, 23 cents; baby, 22 cents. Eastern delivered prices will be two cents per pound. Upcharges on special standardized packs are bulk packs, 50-pound bags, ¼ cent; 25-pound additional 25-pound bags, ½ cent; 10-pound additional 10-pound bags, ¾ cent; mesh bags, 1 cent; 2-cent per pound up, 2-cent; 3-cent per pound up, 3-cent; cellophane bags, 50 1-pound cans, 3½ cents per pound additional.
