

Tinted Hair New Fad Coming Say Beauticians

Shades of baby pink, greens and blues are among the new coiffure colors being featured in beauty shops throughout the United States, according to Pat Jackson, and son Don Johnston, operators of Dorel Hair Co., Complete, Hillsboro, who returned Monday from the national convention recently held at Chicago, Ill.

More than 6400 beauty shop owners and operators discussed the new styles set forth by the fashion council, which consists of 50 beauticians, who are instrumental in establishing new trends in coiffures. Rigid requirements and a three-day session of tests of actual tinted hair styling must be accomplished before acceptance into the council, stated Johnston, who attended a special clinic headed by members of the council.

Hair will be cut to conform with the contours of the face, and features permanent soft waves instead of the usual curls. Maximum of curls has been limited to 12 pin curls instead of the previous 20, required in one setting. This naturally cuts the time of setting hair from 45 minutes to 15 minutes, Johnston said.

Tinting the hair will add a new note to chicness to fashion and will be worn like a new hat to carry out the effectiveness of color scheme, asserted Mrs. Jackson. She added that hair will be worn in a well-balanced manner with long waves that are neatly trimmed to follow head and necklines. She pointed out that although much publicity has been given to the new bob, hair will be cut only in areas of the head to fulfill the gracefulness of line, as a convenience instead of just cutting to suit.

The local hair stylists found that women in the east are current with new coiffure trends and as one travels westward, hair seems to remain longer. Styles seem to be in effect later on the west coast, which, incidentally, is sometimes hastened by the advance publicity in newspapers and popular fashion magazines.

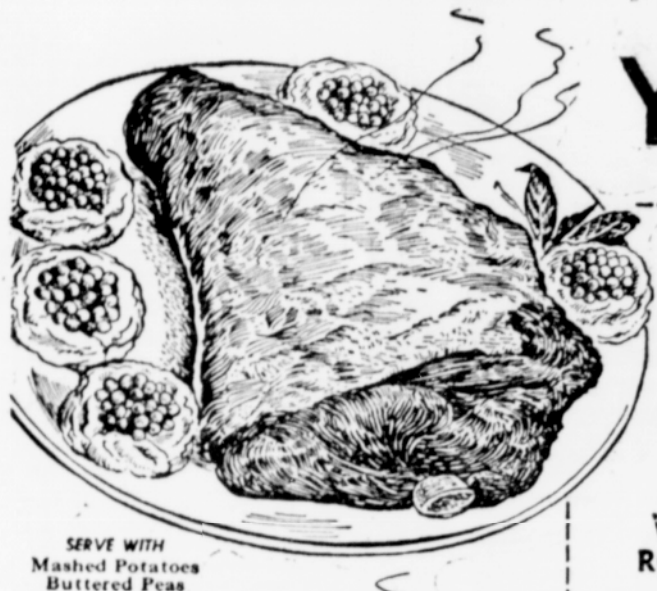

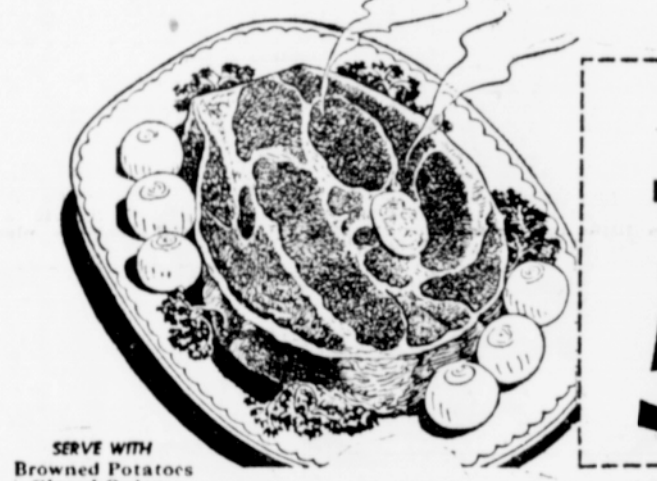

2 beaten eggs
1 cup minced onion
1 1/2 pounds Safeway ground beef
