Conference Held By Churches at Baptist Chapel

Robertson of the Metropolitan Tabernacle of Vancouver, B. C., who gave the highlights of the National convention held in Grand Rapids, Mich., this year. The afternoon business session convened at 2 o'clock. First speaker was Mrs. Howard Borlas, returned missionary from Africa under the Sudan Interior Mission. Mrs. Borlas was missionary during her first term in Nigeria. The second term was in Khartoum, Anglo-Egyptian Sudan. They will soon return to Khartoum. They were followed by Rev. Walter Stewart, pastor of the Columbia View Baptist church of Portland, who spoke on the subject "Frustrate." He gave a word lesson on this one word, and its many definitions and meanings in the varied translations of the Bible. The afternoon's adjournment was followed by a roast chicken dinner.

The evening service opened with the singing of the hymn "I Will Tell the Wondrous Story," and "Sunlight in My Soul," under the leadership of Rev. John P. Past Oracles club will meet with Beulah Moreley on Wednesday, October 13.

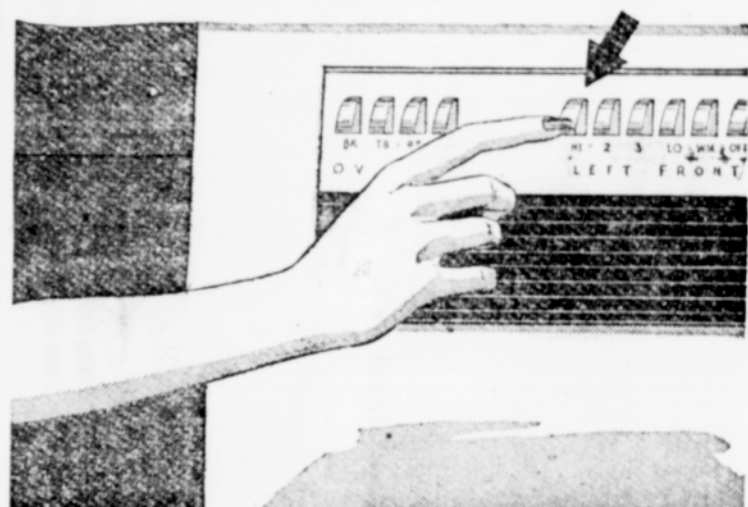


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
