

Verboort 4-H'er Tops County at PI Exposition

Eugene Evers, 17-year-old 4-H boy of Verboort, was the most outstanding 4-H clubber of Washington county at the recent Pacific International Livestock Exposition, according to local 4-H club advisors and officials.

Evers was among the showman-ship finalists in the 4-H dairy show, having won the coveted champion showman award in the Holstein division and the purple ribbon for exhibiting the breed champion. In addition, Evers won a blue ribbon on his producing cow.

Edward McNeil, 16, Sherwood, was also a class champion in the Holstein division and placed first in the senior heifer calf class. Stanley Marugg placed second in the senior heifer calf class. Jack Aten was fifth in the producing cow class. Maynard Sprecher received third in the class with fifth place going to Jack Aten. Aten won another fifth place for his senior heifer calf. They are all from Beaverton.

Washington county's 4-H rabbit judging team, composed of Bob Sanders, 15, and Leslie Donaldson, 15, both of Beaverton, and Shirley Marugg, 16, Portland, took the championship award in that event at the P. I.

Wayne Sargent of Sherwood was third in crop classes. With a pen of three Leghorns, Wilbur Zuver placed first, Homer Zuver second and Wayne Sargent third. Homer won first on a cockerel and two pullets.

County Man Shot On Hunting Trip

The fatal shooting of Ira Grandfield, 41, Forest Grove, occurred Saturday while on a deer hunting expedition in the Kansas Creek area near Tillamook.

The Tillamook county coroner, Alan Lundberg, said Grandfield was killed instantly when his partner, Fred Woodhouse, Sherwood, fired at something moving in the brush.

Woodhouse reportedly told the coroner he had trailed a deer into the brush about half way down a steep hill. He thought Grandfield was on the other side of the ridge at the time. Woodhouse told the coroner they had separated shortly before with plans to meet at the top of the ridge.

When Woodhouse detected movement in the brush, he called out, received no answer and fired, the coroner said.

placed across the road, while the "Guil-ot's" a fun organization from Seaside, dressed in buckskin outfits topped with "raccoon" caps, gave forth with hoots and screeching outbursts.

Luncheon was served in the Banks grade school gymnasium, at which time Ray Vanderzander, president of the Sunset chamber of commerce, credited Portland and Warrenton, Seaside, Astoria and Sunset chambers and the Eastside Commercial club for sponsoring the dedication and lunch.

Aloha Praised
Dana paid tribute to the Aloha chamber of commerce by reciting a poem about Aloha, and praised the organization for the important part they play in the county setup.

The idea of having a road to the sea is not new, according to the February 3, 1921, issue of the Hillsboro Argus, which stated that an inland Donkey Loop Highway club was organized in Washington county from Hillsboro to Forest Grove and thence across the Coast range to Tillamook.

The three chambers concerned selected the site of McNamara's camp near the summit of the range where the old Wilson river now joins with the new Wilson river. Gales Creek thence along the route of the Gales Creek and Wilson river highway. Purpose of this highway was to promote the selling of fruits, vegetables and dairy to Tillamook farmers and other people in the coast area. Even a toll road was attempted, but was defeated.

Newspapers mistakenly announced that it was a "short cut to the sea," and thus the original purpose of the road suffered from this sort of publicity. Ex-Senator Wood announced and thought that portion of the road inside Washington county. The highway would have made the coast less than 40 miles from the Grove and with transportation of that day, automobiles could have made it in three hours. It was stated, Judge Goodin also favored and supported the idea.

The highway commission finally took an active interest in the proposal and agreed to construct two roads, the Sunset (Wolf Creek) highway and the Wilson river highway.

**Barnes Students
To Sell Magazines**
B. W. Barnes school pupils in Hillsboro will start their annual magazine subscription drive Saturday to raise funds for equipment not included in the regular budget. The drive will end Friday morning, October 23, according to Principal Walter Henry.

Since the yearly drives were started nine years ago, the students have used their earnings to purchase such items as a curtain for the auditorium, film, projector, a 16mm movie projector, a screen, a tape voice recorder and suits for the basketball team.

The 8th grade banquet is paid for entirely out of funds from the drive. Henry said the students receive a third of the proceeds for selling the subscriptions to more than 50 different publications. Prizes go to the top salesmen.

Nine Counties Set CROP Work

Regular volunteer county committees to serve the Christian Rural Overseas program, popularly known as CROP, have been established in nine Oregon counties, and several other counties will hold meetings soon to select committee members.

The committees will supervise collection of farm products to load the Oregon CROP train, scheduled to leave here in November, and will enlist volunteer field workers to visit farms.

CROP is really the American farmer's own European and China relief plan, in the traditional pioneer pattern of sharing. Farm, church and community leaders make up the local CROP organization which collects individual contributions. The program is church sponsored, and church organizations supervise distribution abroad of the grain, dairy, poultry and meat products and canned or dried fruit and vegetables collected here.

The nine counties already organized are Benton, Umatilla, Washington, Clackamas, Tillamook, Wasco, Morrow, Gilliam and Linn. Five of CROP promise early organization meetings in Marion, Union, Yamhill, Lane, Jackson and Coos counties.

The Oregon CROP train may not be ready to go for a week or ten days later than the original scheduled date, reports state CROP director, Miles G. Blackenstaff. "The postponement does not have anything to do with Oregon generosity, which is beyond question," Blackenstaff says. "In our enthusiasm, we failed to allow enough time for organization, which must precede any collection."
