PGE Expansion Program Slated For '49 Finish

Portland General Electric company's current \$1,265,000 program of additional interconnections with lines of the Bonneville system, will be fairly well completed by April of next year, Ralph R. Easter, Tualatin Valley division manager of PGE at Hillsboro said this week.

Start of construction on the \$98,000 interconnection at Troutdale is being made this week and when completed next spring will add 160,000 kilowatts of capacity to the PGE system. Another interconnection now being constructed by PGE at St. Marys near Beaverton will be completed this fall at a cost of about \$365,000, adding capacity up to 32,000 kilowatts.

Completed earlier this year, the St. Louis interconnection near Woodburn added 8000 kilowatts of capacity at a cost of more than \$200,000.

The Troutdale interconnection will be the seventh electrical tie to be made between PGE lines and those of the Bonneville Power administration. Others exist at St. Johns in Portland, Harbor, Salem and West Salem.

The combined capacity of 425,000 kilowatts furnished by these connections will allow ample power to flow into the PGE system from federal hydroelectric plants on the Columbia river to provide for recent increase in electrical load and a substantial margin for future development of the lower Willamette and Tualatin Valley regions, Easter said.

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O & C Sale Set November 9

Action has been taken to assure, as far as possible, free competitive bidding on the tracts of O and C timber to be sold November 9, it was announced this week by Daniel L. Goldy, special assistant to the director of the bureau of land management.

In Portland to put into effect the new policies of the secretary of the interior on O and C lands, Mr. Goldy reported that each of 21 tracts of timber to be put up for sale has been examined to determine whether the road system over which the timber must be removed will be available for the use of the purchaser of the government's timber. In most cases where the road system is privately-owned, rights have been acquired by the government to assign the use of the road to the purchaser of its timber. The user of the road is required to compensate the owner of the road for the privilege of removing the timber.
