

## Farmers' Union Hears Discussion Of Ballot Bills

**CHEERFUL GROVE.**—The Gaston Farmers' Union local held its October meeting at the K. P. hall in Gaston last Wednesday evening with a hot-luck supper preceding the meeting.

Mrs. Fred Koennecke and Mrs. Edith Patton attended this meeting. An invitation had been extended to those who wished to listen to the explanation of the 11 measures that will be on the ballot at the November election, given by Peter Zimmerman of Yamhill and Lyle Thomas of Dallas.

**Study of Bills Urged**  
 Mr. Zimmerman urged that voters study these measures carefully and then vote. He has studied the hydroelectric situation with power created from the great Columbia river and its tributaries. This power would be a great benefit to the people of the northwest, he said. What is needed is more cheap power rather than destroy homes and property. Mr. Zimmerman is a member of the Grand, which is opposed to the amendment of Senate bill No. 99 and says to vote 207X—no and save the resources of the Columbia and Snake rivers for ourselves and our children.

**Support Bill Late**  
 Thomas, secretary of the State Farmers' Union followed Mr. Zimmerman with some timely comments that are of interest to farmers. Only 14 minutes and four seconds stood between grain farmers and disaster this year. Farmers should have faced 50 cents a bushel wheat. The price support bill was passed in the last minutes of the 80th congress to extend price support through 1949.

A. H. (Tony) Abts, of Hillsboro, entertained the group with an interesting film on rural farm life

and a barn film for the comics. The films were presented at the beginning of the meeting as Mr. Abts had another engagement that evening. The chairman will make arrangements for the November meeting and Robert, who will appear later.
