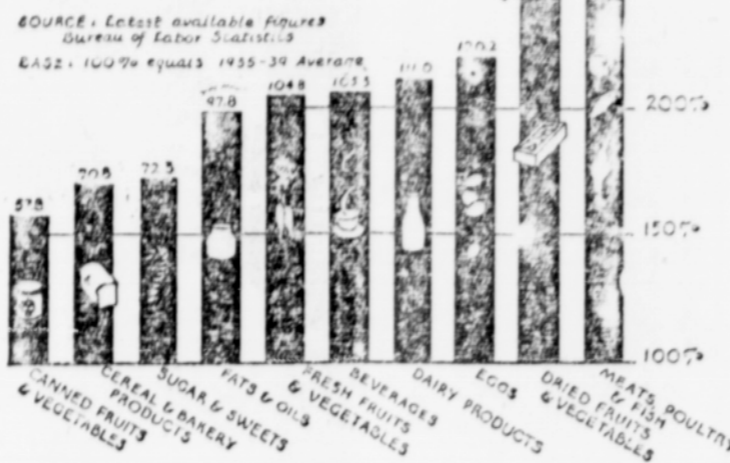
New Secretary Elected

Penny for penny, America's inflation-conscious housewives get most for their food dollar when they shop for canned fruits and vegetables. Latest available U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics figures show the retail average for all foods is up 116.6 percent over 1935-39. As the chart shows, the group of foods registering the greatest price increase was fresh meats, poultry and fish, while canned fruits and vegetables prices increased the least, only 57.8 percent.
