

U. O. Dean Says Music Good Tonic For Our Cares

We should provide our young people with every opportunity to learn fine music as it is one of the best tonics for relieving the worries of each day, Dean Theodore Kratt of the University of Oregon school of music, told Hillsboro Rotarians at last Thursday's noon luncheon.

Dean Kratt used a thought of Longfellow in his conclusion: "and then will the cares which infest the day, fold their tents like the Arabs and silently steal away."

Music appreciation is not difficult if people understand the basic elements of music. These are melody, harmony and rhythm, the speaker said. He demonstrated in an interesting manner at the piano how tunes are developed.

Dean Kratt showed examples of how some of the great musical masterpieces have been popularized in "this commercial age." He said that in many cases this has actually helped to increase interest in the original masterpieces themselves. He stressed the importance of playing the right type of tunes for the appropriate occasion, pointing out that a minuet would hardly be fitting for a school band to play right after the winning touchdown.

GOP Recoups Voter Losses

Republican candidates in Washington county took heart this week with the announcement by W. A. Tupper, county clerk, of registration figures for the November 2 election as submitted to the secretary of state.

Incomplete compilation last week showed registration of Democrats gaining on the G. O. P. since last spring's primary election. The Republican margin last week had been cut to 3,177 registrations. In the final totals, however, Republican registration had stretched the margin to 3,290, thereby nullifying Democratic gains since the primary.

Also listed in the clerk's report were 169 Independents, 12 Socialists, 21 Prohibitionists, 23 Progressives and 112 persons of miscellaneous political faiths.

Federal civil service announces examination for permanent provisional appointment to the positions of laborer, janitor, and window washer in the Veterans Administration.

Persons who desire permanent positions will have an opportunity to file for a civil service examination leading to provisional appointment with permanent classified civil service status in these positions in the Veterans Administration hospital, Veterans Administration Regional office, Portland, and Barnes Veterans Administration hospital, Vancouver, Wash., 31-32.

The entrance salary for the position of laborer is \$2020 a year; for the position of janitor, \$2522 a year; for the position of window washer, \$2182 a year.

Applicants for these examinations will be graded on the basis of their experience and training—no written test is required.
