Spartans Run Over Vikings With Late Onslaught, 31-0

Hillsboro's still unscathed on Spartans, waiting again until the second half before breaking out in a rash of touchdowns, pounded out a decisive 31-0 win last Friday night over arch-rival Forest Grove for their fourth straight win. The score at halftime was 6-0, thereby nearly duplicating the scoring pattern of the Oregon City clash October 1, in which the Spartans scored once in the first half and then rolled up a 32-0 win after the recess.

It wasn't until early in the second quarter that the Spartans could punch over the goal against a big Viking crew which was not at all abashed by the Hillsboro onslaught, unscathed on mark. The Spartans first scoring drive started on the Forest Grove 25-yard line and ended with Right Halfback Roger Madsen going over from the three-yard line.

The Vikings were outgunned, both on the ground and in the air, but they refused to admit it until the Spartans found a spark in the second half. Although Hillsboro dominated play throughout the game and didn't allow the Vikings to get anywhere near scoring territory, the issue was in doubt until the final period when the Davismen scored three times.

A lackluster Forest Grove offense was able to get only 46 yards through the Hillsboro line. The Vikings' deepest penetration was to the Hillsboro 45 in the third period.

Two bewhiskered maneuvers were dragged out by the teams during the contest. To open the second half, the Vikings sent Dalton Davidson to the sidelines, where he took a pitchout from Jerry Hedge. The deadman play gained nine yards. The Spartans dusted off the statue of liberty maneuver to score their

second touchdown in the third period. With the ball on the Viking 10—following a series of passes—Quarterback Dick Voll faded as if to throw again. But Bates came around right and took the ball from Voll and rambled wide to the corner of the end zone to score.

The third Spartan six-pointer was the result of a sustained march from the Hillsboro 20-yard line. Sophomore Halfback Jerry LeBlanc's 30-yard scamper to the Viking 12 was the key again in the advance, which ended when Ron Reule banged over from the three-yard line.

LeBlanc, who compiled an average of 9.1 yards per try in 10 attempts, did the heavy work in the next score also after a Viking fumble had been recovered by tackle Dave Eischen on the Forest Grove 22. LeBlanc carried to the two-yard marker and then slipped over for his first touchdown of the season.

Reserve Halfback Derald Brown accounted for the final Spartan score by punching over from the two-yard line after he had moved the ball into scoring position on the previous play with a 12-yard ramble.

Improvement in the Spartan passing game was evident in the Viking zone. The Spartans completed seven out of 15 aerials for 54 yards. Dick Voll did the bulk of the aerial work with five out of 12 and his mark would have been considerably better had Spartan receivers held on to several perfect pitches. Another of his losses which went to Bob Bates in the end zone in the second period, was nullified by a backfield in motion penalty assessed against the Spartan.

West Linn will play host to the strong Vancouver Trappers, coached by Dutch Shields, veteran southwest Washington grid mentor. The Trappers have been rolling over Washington opponents and earlier in the season, they came into Oregon to down Salem, 33-6.

Hilhi Yearlings Trample Vikings For 53-0 Win

Using to good advantage a gang of hard-running backs and a beefy forward wall that must put terrible strain on the scales, Hilhi's top gridmen ran roughshod for 40 points in the first half last Thursday and finished with a 53-0 slaughter of the Forest Grove yearlings on the local field.

Coach Lou Samsa's first-year men found little opposition in the first two periods and were rarely stopped on a play from scrimmage. On their first play, Halfback Al Leopold bounded through a gaping hole and raced 60 yards for a score. The point try was good and the Spartans held an early 7-0 lead. Fullback Kenny Jarrell took over when the Samsa crew next got the ball and whipped 39 yards to the Forest Grove nine-yard line and then went over on the next play. Leopold then plunged for the conversion.

Then, with the ball in Hillsboro's possession on its 40, the Hilhi frosh took to the air. Quarterback Danzy French fired 35 yards to Ed Ted Vandehy who had raced through the Viking secondary. Vandehy went unimpeded for another (Continued on page 2)
