## September Traffic Death Toll Heavy

Forty-eight persons died in Oregon traffic accidents in September in the heaviest death toll recorded so far this year. Secretary of State Earl T. Newbery has reported.

The September fatalities bring the number of lives lost in 1943 traffic to 299, compared with 322 during the same period last year. All but ten of the persons killed in last month's mishaps met death on highways outside of any city or town.

Newbery warned the toll may grow even higher if late accident reports are received or if persons previously reported as injured do not recover.
