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Senate Bill 99

A blow to future farmers of the Northwest

The bill amending, licensing and acquisition provisions of hydro-electric commission act of Oregon would adversely effect the development of the Columbia Basin.

The proposed Ox Bow dam, 135,000 k. w., of the Idaho Power Company, 30 miles upstream, would throw a road block to the proposed multi-purpose Hell's Canyon dam, 1,350,000 k. w.

The largest deposit of phosphate rock in the world is in southeastern Idaho. Only the federal government could build the transmission lines and supply the low cost electric power for its development. This fertilizer is badly needed here in the West. The farmers are now subjected to the highest price fertilizer in the United States due to the fact that the center of the fertilizer interest is in Baltimore and subjected to high freight rates.

If we are to prosper here in the West our resource development must be taken as a unified whole. The proposed federal construction on the Snake river will take into consideration flood control, navigation, impoundment of 3 1/2 million acre feet of water for irrigation, even flow for higher production of down stream power, low cost power for pumping, and the production of fertilizer.

The health of the people and their recreation values are always considered.

Why we must repeal the iniquitous Senate Bill No. 99

- This bill, in effect, takes away vested water rights of the people and gives those rights to private companies in perpetuity. The minimum license period would be for 50 years.
- It removes the safeguards of the law of 1931 which was enacted to prevent such an occurrence. Governor Earl Snell, in vetoing the measure, said: "The policy of protecting and safeguarding the state's natural resources as enunciated in the act of 1931 seems timely and sound."
- The governor's action in vetoing this legislation was supported by such leading newspapers as the Portland Oregonian, the Oregon Journal and the Salem Statesman. The Oregonian, for example, did not hesitate to call it a "power grab."
- It would make it necessary for the people to follow a costly procedure in acquiring hydro-electric projects which they may need to take over in the public interest. On this phase of the matter, ex-governor Charles Sprague wrote: "To grant the company such permission is to expose the public to a hold up if some time during the licensing period a public body decided to take over the property."
- Our present law is fair to the power companies and to the people. We should keep it that way. This can be done only by invoking the referendum and repealing this unwarranted action of the state legislature and by voting "NO" at the election.
