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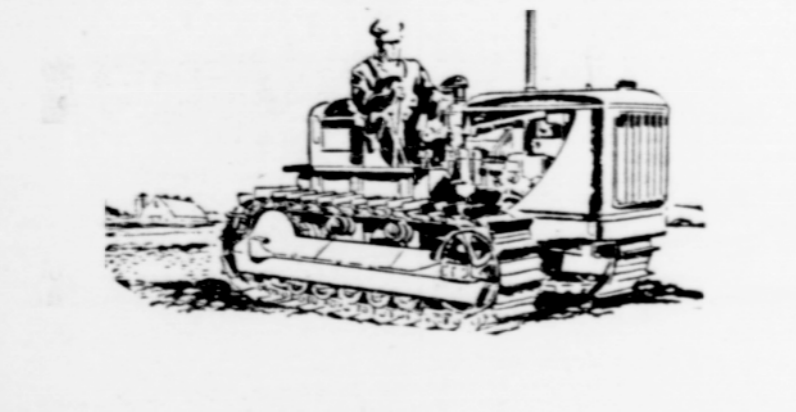

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Vocational School Growth Reported

The Oregon Vocational school at Klamath Falls has grown in 15 months from two classes and 25 students to an institution which today numbers approximately 500 men and women in 28 varied courses of craft and business training. Ninety per cent are World War II veterans and half of them are married.

This was reported by O. I. Paulson, state director of vocational education, to the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs this week following the completion of 15 months of successful operation of the state's newest and biggest vocational school.

Growth of the school has been 25 per cent more than anticipated. Paulson said. Experts predicted that about 400 would enroll in the first year of operations, and succeeded in exceeding that. The school budget was set up on this estimate. Paulson said he expects enrollment in the second year to exceed 600, judging from current growth.

Winston D. Purvine, the school director, reported that the 421 veterans enrolled on September 30 exceeded non-veterans by a ratio of nine to one. Forty-nine veterans had graduated as of that date.

The peak enrollment Purvine said, was last April 15, when 513 students were reported in the average daily attendance.

Most popular courses at Klamath Falls are operation of the state's mechanics, auto body and fender repair, gunsmithing and refrigeration.

About 80 per cent of the students live in school operated housing, at rates from \$53 to \$57 per month for room and board, and \$24 to \$39 for apartments for married veterans. All the 180 apartments are currently filled.

Applicants for admission are advised to write the director, Oregon Vocational School, P. O. Box 1049, Klamath Falls, or contact the county veterans' service officer for application blanks and added information.
