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Flight Training Rule Changed

Veterans applying for flight training under the G. I. Bill no longer have to submit a medical certificate at the time of their application to the Veterans Administration, according to a recent announcement by the V.A.

Under the new V.A. procedure flight schools will be required to secure the medical certificate from the veteran when he actually enrolls in a flying course.

Previously, veterans were required to forward a medical certificate or a certified or photostatic copy, along with their original letter of justification to the V.A.

Public Law 862, which limits veteran enrollments in recreation or avocational courses, requires veterans to submit a letter to the V.A. stating the reasons for wanting to take flying and establishing that flying will be used in their business.

Cruises Offered Marine Reserves

Week-end training cruises, of five days or less, aboard naval vessels are now available to Marine Corps Reservists, it was announced today by Colonel Harold G. Newhart, director of the 13th marine corps reserve district.

Reservists ordered to such training duty will receive no pay or travel expenses, but will be authorized rations in kind, or the equivalent of \$1.20 per day in lieu of rations in kind, for training duty in excess of 24 hours. Assignment of marine reservists will be based on available space on training ships after naval reserve requirements have been filled.

Marine reservists assigned to such training duty would be subject to navy regulations and naval discipline during the period of such duty, and would be under the control of the commanding officer of the naval vessel to which attached.

In the case of organized reservists, application for such cruises should be made through the immediate unit commander, in the case of volunteer reservists through the reserve district director's office.

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
