Miss McNeil's case is only the second to be reported in Washington county this year, the nurse pointed out, making the county one of the most fortunate in the state. In the previous case in January, a 13-year-old boy, also from Tigard, was affected. The Yamhill section of the health district has suffered a recent siege of the malady, Miss Pennington reported.

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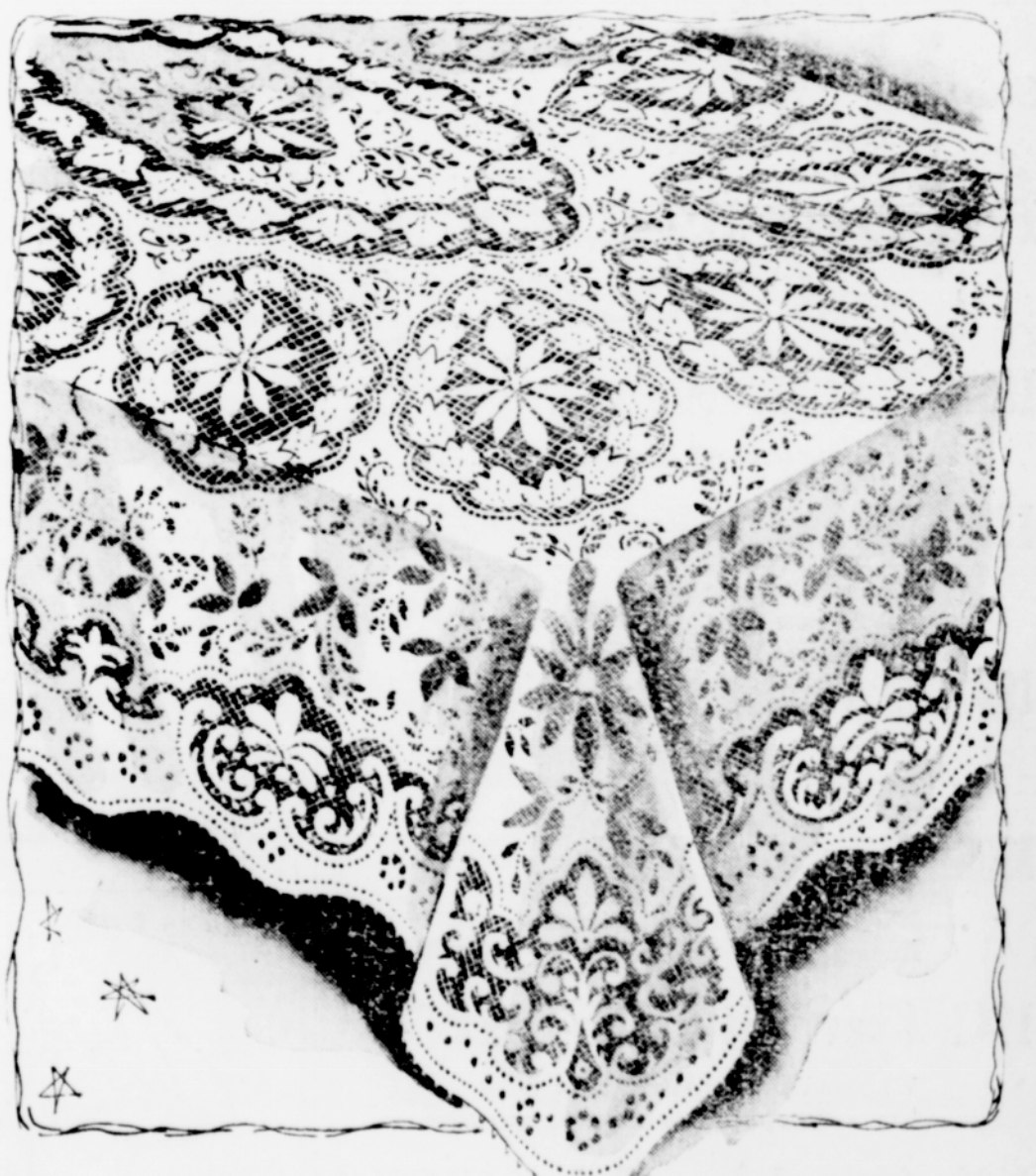
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
