Traffic Death Toll Slumps in October

Oregon's erratically fluctuating monthly highway death toll slumped from the year's high of 51 in September to a six-month low of 32 in October, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry has reported.

The thirty-two fatalities in October traffic is the lowest since 1939, when travel fatalities were approximately half their present level, Newberry said.

Total number of victims for the year now stands at 348, six per cent under the 370 dead at the same time last year. Last October the death toll reached 48.

Rural area mishaps claimed 23 of the victims, a smaller proportion than usual. Newberry declared this fact significant in indicating that danger in cities is reaching its seasonal peak, especially for pedestrians. The secretary warned that early darkness combined with rain and all its attendant hazards produce the need for greatly increased
