

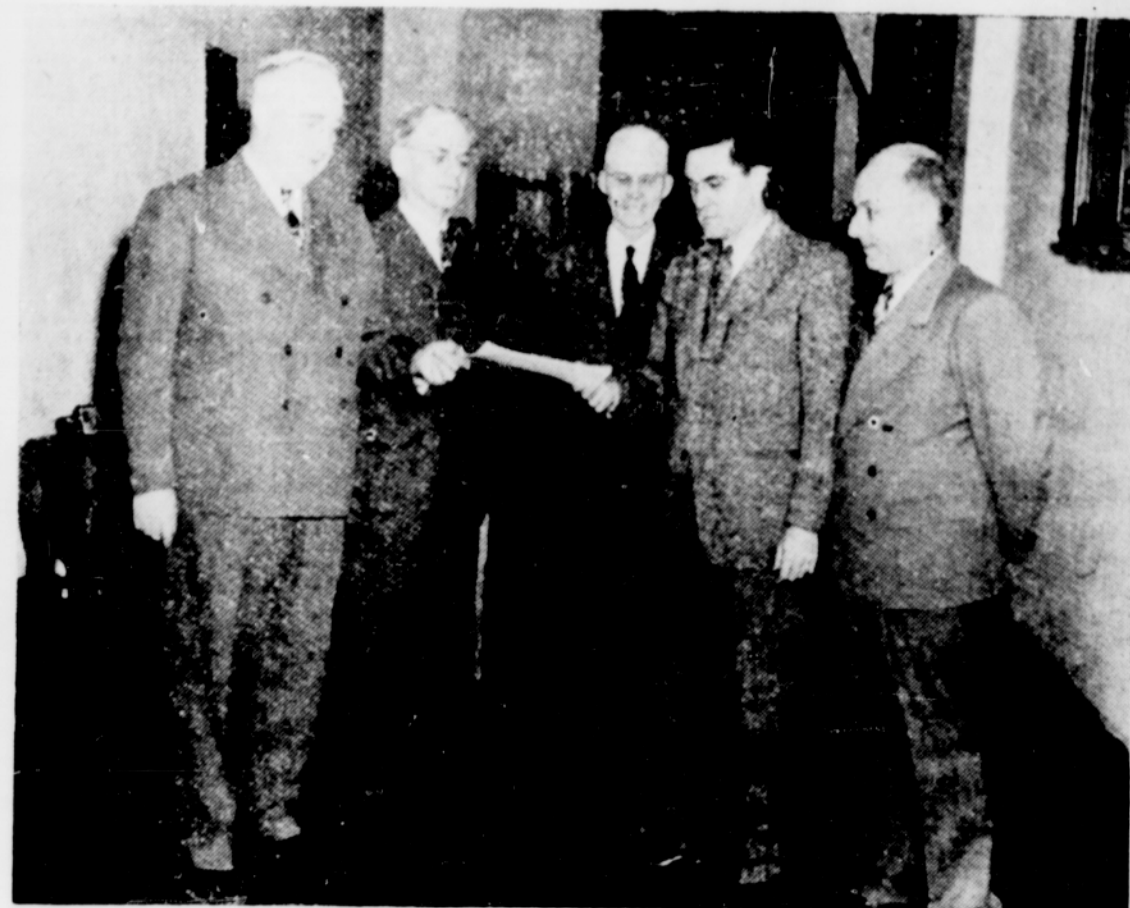
News Pictures Tell Story of Major '48 Events

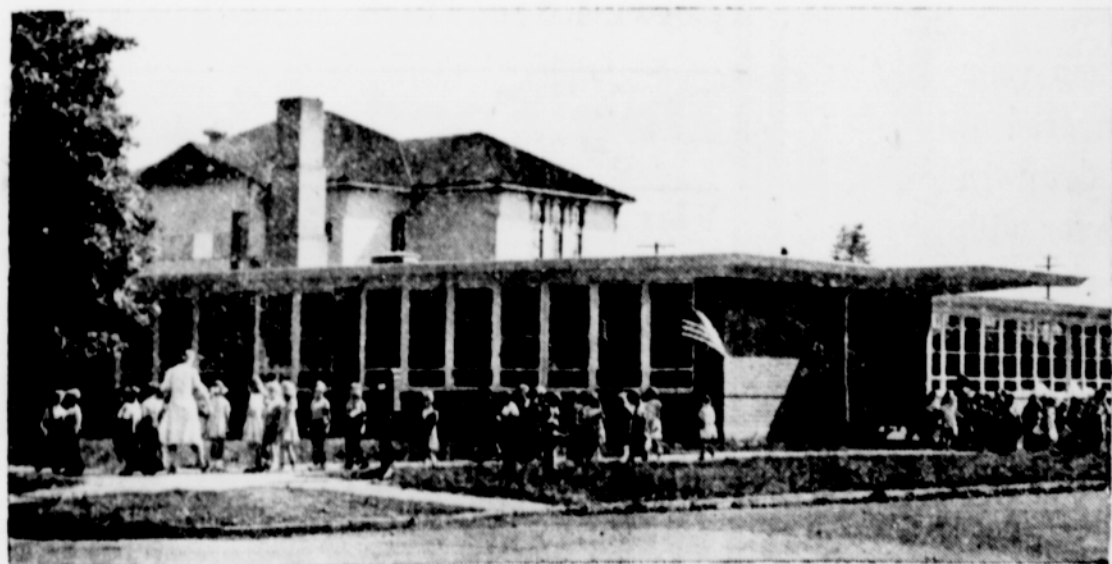
