Chamber to See Seed Movies

Frederick C. Trullinger, sales manager Portland Seed company, will present two 16 mm. sound color films on seed breeding and production at the Hillsboro chamber of commerce luncheon meeting Tuesday. It was announced this week by the forum committee of the chamber.

"Where Flowers Are Bred" is a film which depicts the flower seed farms in California and shows methods of irrigation, cultivation, harvesting and the production of new varieties by selection and hybridization.

The second film, "Breeding Better Food Crops," also in color, was filmed at the vegetable seed farm in California, where seeds of most vegetables used in the United States are grown under irrigation. It shows how seed production begins with ideal plants. This method is followed in production of new varieties and the maintenance of quality in standard varieties. From carefully bred stock seeds, the commercial crops are produced on large acreages, using the up-to-date methods and machinery.

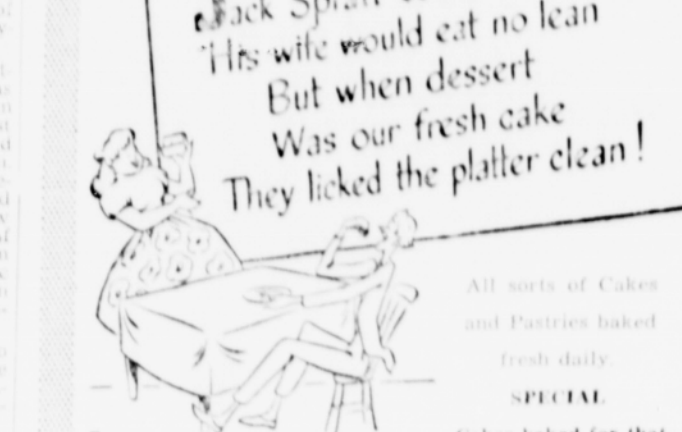
Chamber Schedules Non Member Meet
