Second in Concert Series, January 19

The second in the series of concerts for the members of the Washington County Concert association will be presented at the Hillsboro high school auditorium on Wednesday evening, January 19, at 8 o'clock. John Tyers, brilliant young baritone, will present the concert. Of Mr. Tyers, a Lebanon, Ohio, review says: "Mr. Tyers' voice contains a beautiful lyric quality—not often heard in a baritone and his skill and artistry in interpretation are perfection. His voice quality, range and flexibility, coupled with his charm and acting ability, have marked him for prominence in the music world."

Born in Kansas, John Tyers grew up in Los Angeles and graduated from San Diego college. Participation in school musical events revealed his voice and he was encouraged to study at Juillard School of Music in New York.

His first professional engagements were at the New York World's fair and with the St. Louis and Louisville summer companies. During 1942-43 he sang the role of Figaro in the streamlined modern version of "The Marriage of Figaro" with the Nine O'clock Opera company which toured from coast to coast with enormous success.

War interrupted his career, but on returning to civilian life he was immediately engaged by the Los Angeles Light Opera company to sing the leading role in "Vagabond King" and "Gypsy Lady." At the close of the 1946-47 successful Broadway run of "Gypsy Lady" he sang the same leading role in England with the show running under the name of "Romany Life."

After a trans-continental recital tour, he assumed last spring, the singing lead in the Best Little Musical "Inside USA." He left this to make his debut in grand opera in the famous New York Center Opera company which engaged him for

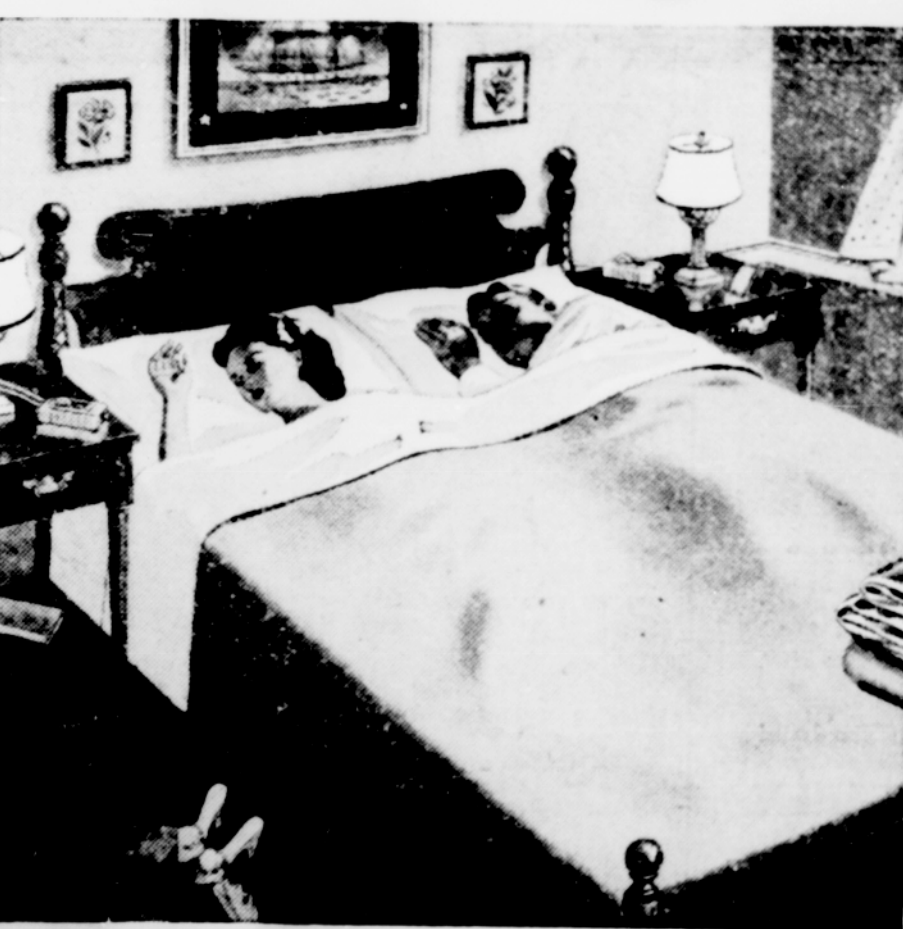
