Local Chamber Receives Plan
Secretary Winan W. Winans, of the Hillsboro chamber of commerce, today announced he had received a copy of the plan for the comprehensive development of land, water, and other resources of the Columbia river and its tributaries.
He said the public is invited to read the 400-page book at the chamber office.
The department plans call for the construction of 238 irrigation and multiple-purpose projects in the states of Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Western Montana. These would bring under irrigation 3,800,000 acres of new land, supply supplemental water for 1 1/2 million acres and make available 10,000,000 kilowatts of additional generating capacity, and provide major benefits in flood control, navigation, fish and wildlife conservation, recreation, and pollution abatement.

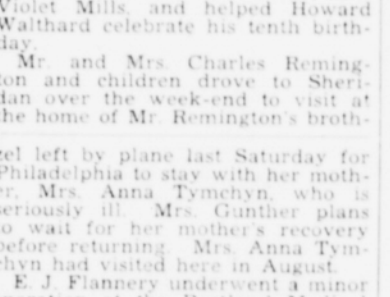
