Adams spent his boyhood days here.

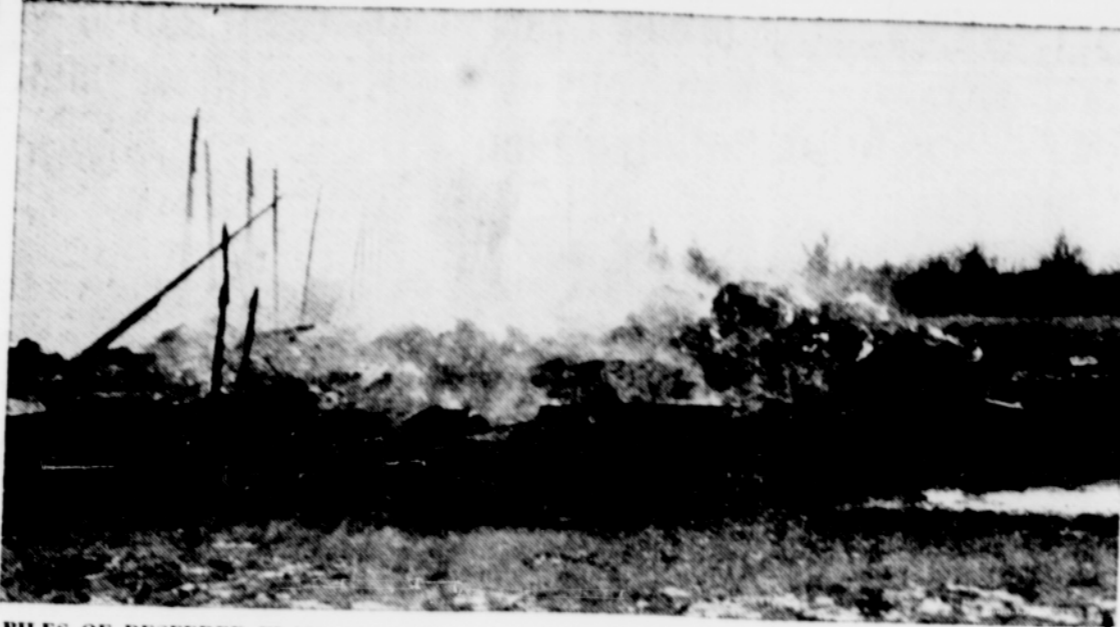
Brookwood

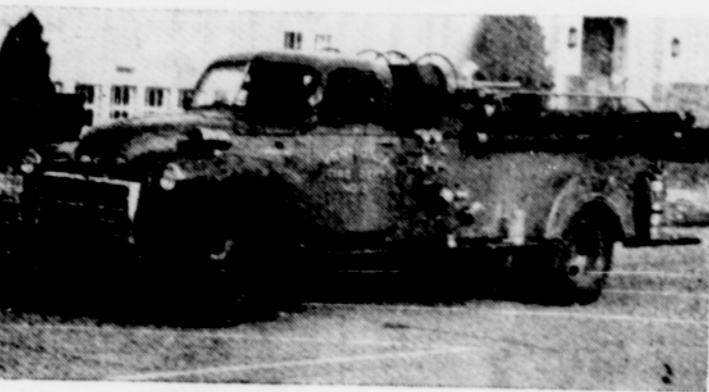
