So far, those registered for the course are police and sheriff officers, but the Red Cross points out that people working in responsible positions such as school bus drivers, ambulance drivers, etc. are especially urged to take advantage of this class either as primary training or as a refresher course.

Classes will be held on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons for two weeks, beginning at 1:30 o'clock for a total of 16 hours of training for preparation to assist in emergencies and sudden illnesses.
