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1948 Payrolls High
A surprisingly bright rift appeared in unemployment clouds this week when the Oregon unemployment commission disclosed that 1948 payrolls exceeded \$940,000,000 and were \$75,000,000 over the previous year. Lumbering shut-downs and seasonal slow-downs during November and December were expected to break the gains made during the first three

quarters of the year.
Although the state unemployment commission paid \$7,744,166 to unemployed workers in 1948, the reserve fund of the department was increased to \$64,624,294 for an all-time high. This was a gain of \$6,773 over 1947. Contributions from employers totaled \$14,186,914.
